Our Churches And What They Shouldn't Cost Us

Year in and year out we go to church in the same unassuming mental frame, paying usually the same amount in the collection plate, supporting rallies, etc., without possibly realizing that there are things we could do to aid ourselves spiritually and financially and support our churches more adequately.

No doubt most churches would welcome better spirmual and Christian attitudes, along with the finances to support the physical part of their programs.

Much of the above could be accomplished through the following 1. Instead of smoking a pack of cigarettes a day, all of us who smoke could easily make out with 15 cigarettes a day. In a week's time more than the cost of a pack of cigarettes would be saved amounting to 35 cigarettes or in money about 40c.

2. Instead of eating steak at one meal in the week, which would amount to about 20c per person, we could get practically the same food value, certainly as full a stomach, from a meat substitute like a well-seasoned codfish cake, which would only cost about 5c, creating a difference of 15c.


