Calhoun, a 1957 graduate of North Carolina College, Durham, won the 110 meter hurdles in the Olympics at Melbourne, Australia in 1956. He was married last August 9 on a TV program (Bride and Groom) which showered the newlyweds with gifts and sent them on a honeymoon to Paris, France.

Ferris told the convention that one of the "unusual circumstances" was that he understood if Calhoun refused to go on the program the girl he was to be married to would refuse to go through with the marriage.

Ferris said Calhoun had been assured by TV officials that "they would look after his interests and were sure he would not lose his AAU amateur rating."
