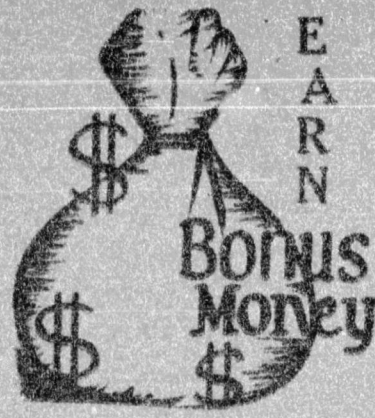

Selma Science Teacher Kills Former Sweetheart

SELMA — Consternation gripped the faculty and student body of Richard B. Harrison High School here Tuesday morning when a jilted lover fired four shots into the body of the librarian, as she sat typing behind the counter of the workshop, after she reportedly told the killer he was not good enough for her.

Frederick L. Parks, 31, described by Martin Luther Wilson, principal, as a mild mannered man, who has been a member of the local faculty for five years, is reported to have gone to the library, where Miss Lois Ernestine Tomlinson was having a home room program, and told her he wanted to talk with her.

Miss Tomlinson is reported to have told him she had nothing to tell him and did not want to discuss the matter with him. It was then that Parks is reported to have pulled a pistol from his pocket and when the smoke cleared away, Miss Tomlinson had toppled over in death and Parks was fleeing the scene.

Parks is reported to have rushed to his car and took off in the direction of Raleigh, at a rapid rate of speed. The officers of the small town were notified, along with Sheriff B. A. Henry in Smithfield. An alarm was sent out for the killer, but he was not apprehended before reaching Raleigh.

Upon arriving there he is reported as having seen Motorcycle Officer R. L. Bunn on the street, and went over and told him what he had done and that he was giving himself up. He was taken to the local police station and the Johnston County officers were notified, Sheriff B. A. Henry, a-

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Church Bonus Money Rules

All purchase slips or receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in the CAROLINIAN. Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the store during the week the "ad" appears. No purchase slips representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases. All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible. All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the purchase was made. All purchase slips should be submitted in the name of the church; and should be in the office of the CAROLINIAN the Monday following close of Bonus period. All churches smaller churches may have an equal opportunity to share in the Bonus Money if the following regulation is expedient. No church group will be awarded 1st Bonus Money consecutively. It should a church receive 1st Bonus Money after the first period it would have to wait until the third Bonus period to be awarded 1st award again. However, this does not mean that second and third awards cannot be sought consecutively. Consequently every church group has the opportunity to secure an award every period. No purchase of over \$50 from any one merchant during a week can be counted. There is a ceiling of \$5 per person a week for grocery purchases. In the event of the same amount of purchases by more than one entry, the award will be divided. Weekly purchase totals should be shown on each packet and total placed on the outside of the envelope carrying the period's entry along with name and address. Bonus money earners will be announced in the issue following the closing of each period. All entries remain the property of THE CAROLINIAN. All tallying is final when the names of the Bonus Money earners are announced in THE CAROLINIAN, and no responsibility is accepted by this newspaper beyond that point. No receipts from banks will be considered, except payment on mortgages.

The CAROLINIAN learned Wednesday from a reliable source that the announcement will be made from the Prison Department in the next day. It is expected to say that Dr. Harold Trigg, well known Negro educator, has been named as the coordinator for a new educational system that is designed to give basic educational courses to inmates of North Carolina prisons.

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Top Lawyer Lauds Acts In Atlanta

ATLANTA — Thurgood Marshall, chief legal counsel for the NAACP, says "threats from newspapers, politicians, or others" will not prevent Negroes from seeking integration through the federal courts.

Marshall told the Atlanta NAACP chapter at its second annual freedom dinner Saturday night that the group will not withdraw a pending federal suit for integration of the Atlanta Public School System.

"The Negroes of Atlanta have been waiting for some time in hopes that their rights would be recognized and that there would be some possibility of desegregation in the foreseeable future," Marshall said.

"We received not a single scintilla of evidence of any good faith movement toward compliance."

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500 Baptists To Raleigh Next Week

Designed, specifically, in the interest of Christian education, the goal of this concerted effort is \$250,000. This figure represents an amount over and above the Convention's regular budget, for other objectives.

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Integration Problem Involves No Negroes

CHICAGO — Chicago's toughest integration problem has nothing to do with Negroes.

It involves a small army of 70,000 white newcomers—Protestants, early American migrants from the South—who are usually proud, poor, primitive, and fast with knives and guns.

This is the substance of an advance release issued by Harper's Magazine stating that a full report of this story will appear in the February issue of the magazine under the title, "The Hillbillies Invade Chicago," by Albert N. Votaw, ace reporter.

These 70,000 white "hillbillies" are Chicago's share of the hundreds of thousands of southerners who have been imported during and since World War II to offset labor shortages in the industrial

centers of Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, and Illinois.

"On the job they are said to lack ambition, but the picture is confused. Many workers are mechanically skilled though not highly competitive. Sometimes malnutrition and ill-health have left them weak," says Albert N. Votaw.
