White Defiant Alleges

CASH OFFER REFUSED IN CLINTON RAPING

CLINTON—One of the most sensational trials held in Sampson County for sometime got underway here in Superior Court Monday when Devane McLamb, youthful married white man was charged with the rape of Miss Lula Belle Lamb, 16, student of Roseboro High School, on the afternoon of Nov. 11, last.

The trial was expected to stir the community because of the circumstances attending the alleged rape. Due to this fact a special venire of 50 was empaneled to hear the evidence, including five race persons, three women and two men. They were all excused by the defense and twelve white men were selected to

SWIFT CAN'T TALK

DURHAM — Sheriff E. G. Belvin's office told the CAROLINIAN Wednesday that Dr. Leroy Swift had not recovered sufficiently to be questioned as to how he was wounded in his home here Friday morning, about 1:05 A.M., when he is reported as teaching his wife how to shoot a gun.

The doctor has been confined to Duke Hospital ever since the shooting and the sheriff's office said that attending physicians had assured Mrs. Swift that he would recover. The interview revealed that his jaw had been shattered by the bullet and that his windpipe had

Love Triangle: Told To "Come In," Man

Went In Shoot'g

Love Affair Said Cause Of Shooting

WARSAW — Another love triangle was brought to light in this eastern farming section Saturday morning, when McKinley (Scott) Wiggins fired a bullet into the heart of William Lewis Morrissey, after finding him in the company of his wife, at the home of Willie Vann, located on the outskirts of town.

According to arresting officers Wiggins suspected Morrissey of paying too much attention to his wife and it is believed that he had warned Morrissey about his dislike of his association with his wife.

It was also reported that Wiggins and his wife, Narcissus, quarrelled Friday night, and that she left home and spent the night with her sister, Vann's wife. Wiggins is reported to have gone to Vann's home, about 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, with his two year old child.

He is further reported to have knocked at the back door and was told to "Come in." Persons in the house are reported as saying that Wiggins did not come in, but knocked again. Mrs. Vann is alleged to have repeated "Come in," in a loud tone.

Wiggins is then reported to have opened and began "blasting away" with two shots from a .32 Calibre automatic pistol. One shot is said to have gone wild and the other struck Morrissey in the bottom of the heart, causing death instantly. He is said to have grabbed his leg and started toward Wiggins, but turned and fell on his face, with his legs in the dining room of the
