

PASTORS' CONTEST ENTERS FINAL WEEK

State-Wide Contest To End Mar. 10

Although Rev. M. W. Morgan, pastor of the First African Baptist Church, Goldsboro, is closing the gap between the first and second spot, Rev. H. W. Cunningham, pastor of First Congregational Church, Raleigh, is still in first place with 5,320 votes, as counted 5 p. m. Tuesday.

Rev. Morgan is second with 3,610 votes.

Holding the third place is Rev. W. R. Booker, pastor of Jones Chapel Church of Roxboro with 2,380 votes.

Rev. T. C. Hamans, pastor of Manley Street Christian Church, Raleigh, moved up from fifth place to fourth position with 1,870 votes.

Dropping into fifth place is Rev. Robert L. Shirley, pastor of East Davie Street Presbyterian Church with 800 votes.

First prize is \$100. A botany suit will be given as second prize and a Gleneagle topcoat will be the third prize.

Klan Leader Stands Trial On March 10

LUMBERTON — The grand juror of Carolina Ku Klux Klan, the Rev. James W. (Calf) Cole, will be tried in the Roberson Superior Court Tuesday, March 10, on an indictment of inciting a riot.

Maurice Braswell, solicitor, said Monday that he had calendered the Cole case for the first order of business on that date.

To be tried at the same time is James Garland Martin, 37, of Reidsville, who faces the same charge.

The Rev. Cole, 33, of Madison, S. C., and Martin were charged after gunning Lumbee Indians broke up an attempted Klan rally near Maxton on January 18. Martin

Mrs. O. S. Bullock Interred At High Point; Was Church Leader

Mrs. O. S. Bullock, wife of the pastor of Raleigh's First Baptist Church, was laid to rest in a cemetery at High Point Monday morning, following funeral services at the church here at 3:30 p. m. Sunday. Mrs. Bullock died at her home, Friday.

A native of Louisa County, Va., she was graduated from Virginia State College, Petersburg, Va., in 1906. She married Dr. Bullock in 1908 while he was pastor of the High Point First Baptist Church. Mrs. Bullock came to Raleigh with her husband in 1921 at which time he assumed the duties as pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city.

Mrs. Bullock was supervisor of the Young People's Department of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, U. S. A. for 20 years, and organized and directed the Sally Mial's Circle at the First Baptist Church. She also organized the local Ministers Wives Auxiliary and served on the board of the Sojourner Truth Branch

Widely known in this area for her work with children in the church, Mrs. Bullock's virtues were extolled by the Rev. C. E. Griffin, who delivered the eulogy. The Rev. J. H. Clanton presided.

Church Bonus Money Rules

All purchase slips or receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in THE CAROLINIAN.

Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the store during the week the "ad" appears.

No purchase slips representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases.

All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible.

All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the purchase was made.

All purchase slips should be submitted in the name of the church, and should be in the office of THE CAROLINIAN the Monday following close of Bonus period.

In order that smaller churches may have an equal opportunity to share in the Bonus Money the following regulation is expedient: No church of over 200 members will be awarded 1st Bonus Money consecutively, i.e. should a church of 200 or more members receive 1st Bonus Money after the first period, it would have to wait until the third Bonus period to be presented 1st award again, except where a church has 200 or less members, then it could win top Bonus awards consecutively. However, this does not mean that second and third awards cannot be sought consecutively. Consequently every church group has the opportunity to secure an award every period.

No purchase of over \$300 from any one merchant during a week can be counted.

There is a ceiling of \$35 per person a week for grocery purchases.

In the event of the same amount of purchases by more than one entry, the award will be divided.

Weekly purchase totals should be shown on each packet and total placed on the outside of the envelope carrying the period's entry along with name and address.

Bonus money earners will be announced in the issue following the closing of each period.

All entries remain the property of THE CAROLINIAN.

All tallying is final when the names of the Bonus Money earners are announced in THE CAROLINIAN, and no responsibility is accepted by this newspaper beyond that point.

No receipts from banks will be considered, except payment on mortgages.
