## Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw Is First Of Race To Address N. J. Audience

HACKENSACK, N. J. — Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw of Wilmington, N. C., who presides over the sixth episcopal district, A. M. E. Zion Church hurled another barrier here Sunday morning, when he delivered a message to about 3,000 persons of both races at the George Washington Memorial Park, located in nearby Paramus.

It was the 11th annual meeting, sponsored by the Bergen County Council of Churches and the first time a Negro has appeared in the principal role. The services began at 6:30 and ended at 7:45. An integrated choir of 140 voices furnished the music. The entire service was carried by radio station WFAT and was heard throughout the area.

Dr. Rufus Patterson Perry, 54-year-old chemist, took over the reins of the 100-acre university in a program that also marked the 91st anniversary of the founding of Johnson C. Smith. 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## Church Bonus Money Rules

All purchase slips or receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in the CAROLINIAN. Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the store during the week the "ad" appears. No purchase slip representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases. All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible. All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the purchase was made. All purchase slips should be submitted in the name of the church and should be in the office of the CAROLINIAN the Monday following close of Bonus period. In order that smaller churches may have an equal opportunity to share in the Bonus Money the following regulation is expedient: No church of fewer than 200 members will be awarded 1st Bonus Money consecutively. I.e. should a church of 200 or more members receive 1st Bonus Money after the first period, it would have to wait until the third Bonus period to be presented 1st award again, except where a church has 500 or less members, then it could win on Bonus awards consecutively. However, this does not mean that second and third awards cannot be sought consecutively. Consequently every church should have the opportunity to secure an award every period. No purchase of over \$300 from any one merchant during a week can be counted. There is a ceiling of \$35 per person a week for grocery purchases. In the event of the same amount of purchases by more than one entry, the award will be divided. Weekly purchase totals should be shown on each packet and total placed on the outside of the envelope carrying the period's entry along with name and address. Bonus money earners will be announced in the issue following the close of each period. All entries remain the property of THE CAROLINIAN. No receipts from banks will be considered, except payment on mortgage.
