This reporter could not contact the City Manager (who was on vacation) nor the City Attorney, (whose office said he was away Saturday) for comment, but Mrs. Fairly L. Bandy, Recreation Department director, would not confirm or deny that new order was in effect, saying only that she thought it was being handled by the Recreation Commission, which had not met on the issue.

Meanwhile Chase says that colored citizens "are already fishing in the lake."

**Legionnaires To Maintain Segregation**

ROANOKE, Va. — (ANI) — Two resolutions aimed at ending the color line in the Virginia department of the American Legion were rejected last week at the 40th annual convention of the organization.

One resolution contained a request that Negro children be given an opportunity to participate in the memorial contest. The other asked that the Virginia Legionnaire, monthly publication of the department, stop designating Negro posts by race. Both committees receiving the requests rejected them, and no action was taken on the convention floor when the committees reported their action.

The racial designation resolution was offered by Atterbury Post No. 5 of Norfolk, under the sponsorship of C. M. Dancy Jr., one of Norfolk's three Negro delegates to the convention.

The American Legion is anti-Negro in most parts of the country, particularly in the South. The Virginia department does not permit Negro boys to participate in the Boys State or the national convention.

Jones, general chairman, and his several committees who are arranging the entertainment for the thousands of visiting Bills and Daughters of the Improved Benevolent Protective Order of Elks of the World (IBPOEW) expected here August 23-30 for the 60th annual convention of the Order made famous by the late J. Finley Wilson.

Morning Star Lodge No. 49 and Columbia Lodge No. 85, with their respective Temples, are joint hosts to the international fraternal group which boasts a membership of near 700,000.

The convention opens with a pilgrimage Saturday, August 23, to the famous John Brown Farm located 40 miles west in the West Virginia-Maryland mountains for a dedicatory service. This is in recognition of the great abolitionist who captured the federal arsenal at Harpers Ferry, Va. (now West Virginia) in an abortive attempt to free the slaves in 1859— for which he (John Brown) was later hung along with 21 others.
