Asheville's Board Grants School Change Request

ASHEVILLE — The Asheville City School Board has granted a request for enrollment of a group of Negro students from Burnsville whose parents objected to sending them to a local elementary school here.

Some of the younger children were not expected to take advantage of the arrangement because of the distance, about 40 miles each way, involved in the plan.

Yancey County officials in Burnsville said they had not yet decided if the school there would remain open. School Supt. Hubert D. Alstine had said earlier it would be closed unless a minimum of 12 students decided to remain enrolled.

Wake Man Says Night Club Killing Was An Accident

FUQUAY SPRINGS — Charged with the death of a 19-year-old boy who left him a dime last Saturday night, a man is being held in custody according to reports from Wake County Sheriff's office.

The youth, John Avery Stone, was pronounced dead when he arrived at a funeral home in Fuquay Springs. Coroner M. W. Bennett investigated the death.

From a signed confession, it was reported that 21-year-old James H. Dewar shot Stone accidentally as he reached in his pocket for change to pay for a hot dog in a Buckhorn night club at 11 p. m.

Dewar stated he borrowed a .38-caliber pistol from Willie H. McNeil in the afternoon. While in the nightclub, he asked the victim Stone for 15 cents.

"He told me he didn't have 15 cents, but had a dime I could have," Dewar declared.

"I reached in my pocket later to get 15 cents to buy a hot dog. I pulled out the pistol and it went off. I was standing about two feet from Stone at the time, James further commented.

When the pistol went off, John Stone said, "You shot me, James."

2 Crosses Burn At Winston-Salem School After Peaceful "Mixing"

WINSTON-SALEM — Two crosses burned here Thursday night at a desegregated high school in the wake of a second day of peaceful integration of schools in the state.

The six-foot crosses flamed up within 45 minutes on the grounds of Reynolds High School here, where a Negro girl had registered quietly among hundreds of white classmates only a few hours before.

Although they investigated both of the cross-burnings, Winston-Salem police declined to say whether they thought the Ku Klux Klan, vandals or just "mischievous" kids, had been responsible for the incidents. Smoldering ashes of the crosses were extinguished by police officers.

The first cross was found burning at the rear of the high school auditorium, only a few feet from the structure. The other was found, still smoking, about 45 minutes later. It was on a sloping

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President's School Stand Is Rapped By Gov. Meyner

WASHINGTON — Gov. Robert B. Meyner of New Jersey said Sunday that President Eisenhower should take a public stand because this "is the most important issue in our international affairs."

"It is the crux of whether we are going to be successful in the Middle East and Africa and Asia," he said.

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Baseball Bat Used In Fight

NEW YORK — Five white men and a woman were booked Friday on charges stemming from a clash with a group of Negroes near the Woodside Housing Project in Queens Friday night.

Police said the disturbance started when the six, two of them carrying baseball bats, left a party where they had been drinking and apparently set upon the first Negro they saw without provocation.

Within minutes, dozens of persons were engaged in a free-for-all, which was quelled in about 10 minutes when seven detective cruisers and four radio cars arrived at the scene, police said.

One of the white men, identified as Richard Roger, 22, was seized as he tried to beat Clarence Cherry, 41, a Negro with a bat, police said. Another Negro, Alfonso Thompson, 16, also narrowly escaped being beaten.

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Says King Wants To Be Martyr

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — An ardent champion of white supremacy, Police Commissioner Clyde Sellers, paid the \$14 fine of integration leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. rather than let him go to jail last week.

Sellers said the minister wanted to be jailed as part of a publicity stunt to boost sales of his forthcoming book on the fight for racial equality in Montgomery.

Dr. King, a leader in the 1956 mass Negro boycott of segregated city buses here, disclaimed any publicity intent.

"Neither am I motivated by a desire to be a martyr," he added.

The commissioner identified himself as the anonymous person who paid Dr. King's fine of \$10 and costs assessed Friday when he was convicted in City Court of refusing to obey a police order.

NEWS COVERAGE FAILS TOLD

CHAPEL HILL — A major fault noted in much of the news coverage of race and segregation events in the south by northern and metropolitan press of the nation lies in the fact that reporters have merely reported on practical incidents and have not taken time to give deeper interpretation of the background of the problems, the south (UPI).

William Westendick, editorial director of Newsday of Long Island, made that statement Saturday in a speech delivered to the N. C. Conference of News and Feature Writers.

He said a main trouble with many modern journalists is their unwillingness to dig deep to find out more that should be analyzed and interpreted to readers.
