12th Dorie Miller Award Given Packing Workers

CHICAGO — (ANP) — The 12th annual Dorie Miller award, given annually by the Dorie Miller foundation for "notable contribution in the field of human and race relations," went last week to the 150,000-member United Packinghouse Workers of America, AFL-CIO.

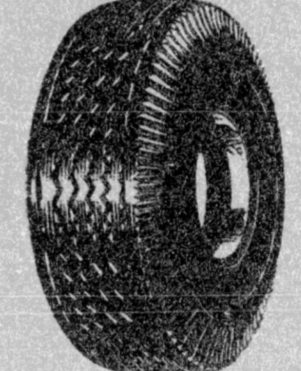
The award was received on behalf of the union by international vice-president Russell R. Lasley, one of the nation's top Negro union officials, before 700 civic, religious and union leaders at the Dorie Miller foundation headquarters.

The union is the first labor organization to receive the award, named after the Negro mess attendant aboard the battleship Arizona whose exploits under fire during the Pearl Harbor bombing did much to speed elimination of racial bias in the armed forces.

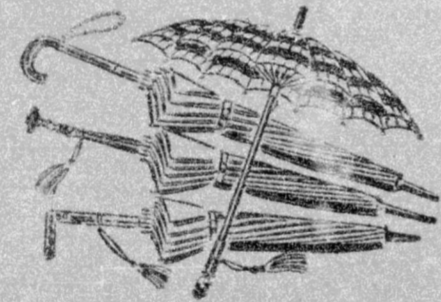

HEADS NUCLEAR PROJECT — Harry Ferguson, former operating vice president of Pennsylvania Power & Light Co., has been named general manager of the Carolina Virginia Nuclear Power Associates project to build a nuclear-fired power plant at Parr Shook, S. C. The Parr plant, first of its kind in the Southeast, is to be completed in 1962. It is a joint project of Carolina Power & Light, Duke Power, South Carolina Electric & Gas and Virginia Electric & Power.

Raleigh Man Is CP & L Pioneer

A Raleigh man, Donald K. Fry, has completed 25 years of service to win membership in Carolina Power & Light Company's Pioneer Club.

Fry first joined CP&L's distribution and service department in Zebulon in August, 1933. He was transferred to Raleigh the following year and in 1935 became an assistant valuation engineer. He was promoted to valuation engineer in 1938.

He served two years as Navy lieutenant during World War II, and returned to CP&L as head of the Valuation Department after discharge. He transferred to the company's State Department in 1946, and has served since that time as rate engineer.

Fry is a native of Princeton, West Va., received his early education there, and in 1933 graduated from N. C. State College with a Bachelor's Degree in electrical engineering.

He is a member of the N. C. Society of Engineers, the Raleigh Engineers Club, and is a member of the board of stewards of the Hayes Barton Methodist Church.

Mrs. Fry is the former Ann Mildred Powell of Vance County. They have two children, Donald Fry, Jr., who is a senior at Duke University, and Sandra, age 12.

Randolph Quits Powell's Group For Reelection

NEW YORK — (ANP) — A Philip Randolph, president, International Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, has resigned as chairman of the Independent People's Committee for the reelection of Rep. Adam C. Powell, Jr.

The point of friction was the usage of Randolph's name, without authorization, stating that members of the Liberal party were going to write in Powell's name on the ballot in November.

In a letter of resignation addressed to Powell, the well-known labor leader explained that he was unalterably opposed to the use of immoral means for a moral end. (Powell is still on Caribbean vacation.)

Also, Randolph felt that it was advisable to resign as chairman of the committee since he did not wish to be committed, through any organization, to the support of any Republican or Democratic candidate when "I am neither a Democrat nor a Republican."



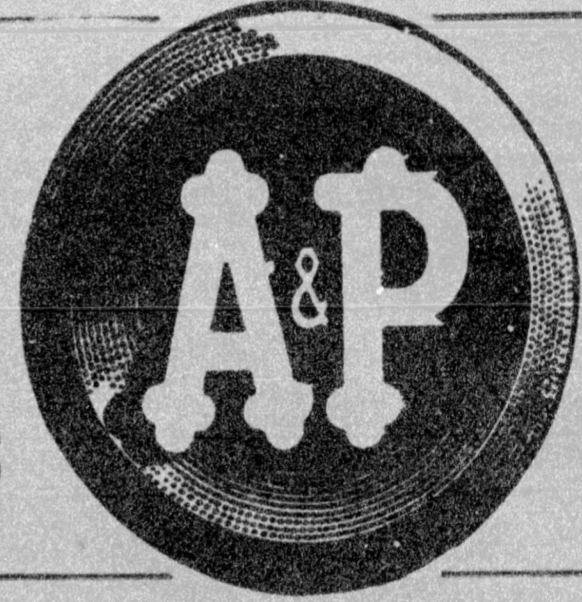
