The FEMININE FRONT this week salutes the volunteer workers in the United Fund Campaign of Raleigh. The campaign was officially launched this week with wide television, radio, and press coverage. This salute is specifically to those women who will canvass residence and small neighborhood business for contributions.

Having worked with this division of the campaign for two consecutive years, I know that the wonderful spirit of cooperation exhibited by the workers who ring doorbells deserves special commendation. This is especially true in light of the fact that one finds that the same workers are usually contacted to serve year after year in nearly all similar community drives.

Housewives who are contacted in their homes often feel that they or their husbands have given on their jobs and that what they can afford to give at home would be insignificantly small. But that is not true. Those small contributions, multiplied several times, amount to large ones and help greatly toward the overall goal. Raleigh's goal this year is over four hundred thousand dollars.

There is a concerted effort this year to inform the public of the good community service of the United Fund in Raleigh. Those agencies which serve our people most directly are the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, the Free Lunch Program, Tuttle Community Center, the Bloodworth Street YMCA, the Sejourner Truth YWCA, and the Raleigh Day Nursery in Chavis Heights.

I do not wish to minimize the services of other member agencies but those named above affect the largest number of us most often and most directly.
