

### Sidney Poitier Taking Daily Exercises For 'Porgy' Role

HOLLYWOOD, Calif.—(AP)—Indicative of the arduous life that actors lead is the fact that Sidney Poitier, currently acting the role

of Porgy in the movie version of "Porgy and Bess," has to take special exercises to aid the circulation in his legs.

For his starring role Sidney has his legs, from the knees down, strapped to boards built up at the back so that the toes of his shoes just clear the cobblestones of the set.

Poitier shuffles around on the boards throughout the film's action. He can only endure the awkward position for an hour at best.

At the end of each scene he must restore the circulation in his legs. This he accomplishes by skipping rope near the set.

The exercise is repeated each morning before Poitier reports for work and then again at night when he leaves for home.

### Dr. Rudolph Jones Addresses AME Zion Meet At Fayetteville

FAYETTEVILLE — Dr. Rudolph Jones, president, Fayetteville State Teachers College, told the laymen of the Central North Carolina Conference, AME Zion Church, that service to humanity was the thing that counted in a Christmas life Sunday when he spoke at the 6th annual Laymen's Conference, held at Evans' Metropolitan Church, Rev. C. R. Coleman, pastor.

Dr. Jones traced the virtues of one's life who would travel the high road. He pointed out that one has to know himself before he could apply himself to the task of climbing the high road. He emphasized the fact that one must act so basic enough sense to follow properly. He then told the audi-

ence of the factors that cause one to grope along the low road to despair and defeat.

Rev. Coleman welcomed the churchmen on behalf of Evans' Church. A. H. Jones, president of the Conference outlined the purpose of the meeting and pointed to the fact that the laymen had originated an extensive expansion program and as a result they were spearheading the building of small churches and the repairing of many rural churches.

W. M. Steels, field organizer, presented Dr. Jones, Alexander Barnes, Director, Public Relations and Social Welfare, responded to Dr. Jones. Bishop R. L. Jones was

also in attendance and reviewed the work of the laymen in the 4th Episcopal, which he presides over. Mrs. E. S. Simmons, secretary, read the treasurer's report, in the absence of C. M. Palmer. She also conducted the collection of reports from contestants who are vying to be the bride and groom of the Central Conference, when it meets in Sanford, in November.

conducted by students of the college.

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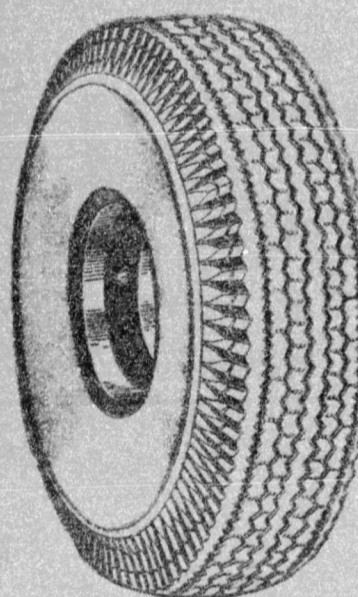
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
