Levittown Housing Hearing Postponed

NEWARK, N. J. — (AP)—On request of Ira Goldman, counsel for Levitt and Sons, Inc., a public hearing concerning charges of discrimination by two complainants against the developers of Levittown, N. J., originally scheduled for November 14, has been postponed to Monday, December 15. It was announced by Dr. John P. Milligan, director of the division against discrimination.

The New Jersey Law Against Discrimination, as amended in June, 1947, contains a section, 15-25-3c, which states: "A publicly assisted housing accommodation shall include all housing built with public funds or public assistance pursuant to (eight chapters of the laws from 1938 to 1949), and all housing financed in whole or in part by a loan, whether or not secured by a mortgage, the repayment of which is guaranteed or insured by the Federal Government or any agency thereof."

The complainants, Franklin E. Toild, and Wilbur R. James, both of Burlington City, allege that they were denied the opportunity to purchase homes in the Levittown development in Burlington County.
