Harry Golden Predicts Full Citizenship Status For Negroes In Few Years

DURHAM — All obstacles to the Negro's achievement of first-class citizenship will be removed "in your life time," Harry Golden, famed author and candidate for graduation at North Carolina College here Sunday.

Golden warned the 377 candidates, however, that removal of segregation and discrimination barriers will mean "greater, not less, responsibility" for them.

The Negro's salvation, he continued, lies in "more education and greater political activity," both recommended to the graduates as "the only way for you in a world where Negroes will have to take pot luck with all other Americans."

President Alfonso Elder introduced the commencement speaker, in NCC's 37th finals celebration, and conferred degrees.

Outstanding among degree recipients were 27 undergraduates who finished with honors and three students who received law degrees.

Honor students included: Edward Boeier, Wilmington, and Fred C. Icard, Lenoir, "summa cum laude"; Mae Frances Barham, Knightdale; Hayworth L. Bradley, High Point; Alfonso Gantt, Winston-Salem; Larry Ingram, Durham; Dornis E. McNeill, Durham; Evelyn C. Hall, Plymouth; Oxygwenia Hughley, Fayetteville; Elizabeth Jones, Durham; Jean Q. Lloyd, Council; Vivian M. Lloyd, Rocky Mount; William McPhatter, Sanford; Alma D. Melvin, Fayetteville; Mary J. Mills, Jackson; Thaddeus S. Moore, Mayville; Carolyn Smith, East Orange, N. J.; Mary A. Graduates in law, with L.B. degrees, Lawrence B. Ennett of Wilson; Russell C. Washington, Dillon, Va.; and Richard A. Young, Seattle, Washington.

In his commencement address, Golden said Negroes must exert themselves politically, especially in voting. "And do not fret about what your enemies call 'bloc voting.' Each group believes it program is in the best interests of the United States.

Speaking of education as a responsibility, he said there must be nothing short of a "mad stampede" of the Negroes of the South into the classrooms of America. "Education, like love, will find a way, even if you have to study by the light of the moon."

In addition to the main speaker, several local dignitaries took part on the NCC commencement program, including Father Thomas P. Hadden, St. Teresa of Avila Church, Invention; Rev. William Fuller, Mt. Zion Baptist Church, scripture; Dr. J. H. Hubbard, Sr., presentation of Bibles to the graduates; and Rev. J. T. Jones, Asbury Temple Methodist Church, benediction.

Dean G. T. Kyle presented candidates for undergraduate degrees, Dean William H. Brown, for graduate degrees, and Dean A. L. Turner presented the three students who received the Bachelor of Laws degree.

TAX TIPS

Employers liable for income tax withheld and social security taxes in excess of \$100 for the month of May must deposit such taxes with a depository, James A. Lucas of the Internal Revenue office in Raleigh reported today. Stressing the importance of compliance with the deposit deadline of June 15, 1962, Lucas added that a Form 450 should be used for this purpose.

Deposits may be made in local authorized banks, or Federal Reserve Banks, said Lucas.

Employers who do not have a copy of Circular E, "Employer's Tax Guide", may obtain it from any local IRS office. This publication contains a full discussion of employment taxes together with tables and percentage methods for

Rochester Whites Join Negroes In City Bias Charges

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (ANP) — In an unusual action, whites here joined Negroes in charging that the city schools are racially segregated in a complaint filed in Federal District court last week.

James A. Sandifer, attorney for the NAACP, said it was the first school segregation complaint to be joined by whites.

The complaint asked that the Board of Education be enjoined from continuing the alleged segregation in the city schools. It said that the board had unlawfully and unconstitutionally made and enforced regulations establishing certain racially segregated public schools in the city.

"We're not saying at this moment that this segregation is intentional or deliberate in the true sense of the word," Sandifer said, "but it is harmful and wrong and there is a positive need for the board to do something about it."

The complaint listed twenty-two children from ten families as plaintiffs. Four of the ten families are white.
