**The Relationship of Church and World Affairs.**

First let us define the words Church and Religion.

Mr. Webster says that the church is a collective body of Christians.

Mr. Webster also says relations means mutual connection between two or more things.

Now if you will allow me a paraphrase, or reword our theme for better understanding, predicated on the definition of the two words contained in the theme (religion and church) the theme would read as follows: "The Mutual Connection of a Collective Body of Christians and Current Events of the World."

Since this theme has to do with Religion and Church, which is love and obedience towards God, let us use the scripture as our guide in developing this theme.

I firmly believe that the following passages of Scripture can be applied either to an individual or a nation.

Jesus teaches that Religion is based purely on Love, first for God, and then our fellowman. He herefore we must have love in a group of Christians in order to get along with world affairs.

As we read the newspapers and listen to the news commentators on radio and television, we can only drop the conclusion that the things that are primary in world affairs is hatred, greed, the seeking of power, wars and mass murder. This in itself seem to have no connection with Religion and Church at all; therefore, Religion had no relations with this phase of world affairs.

2. This has been the dark side of our theme, but if we look a little closer we will be able to see that Religion does play a major role in some phases of world affairs.

We have the great Missionary program sponsored by the various churches of all faiths. The work done by these organizations in heathen lands is a credit to Christianity, in that they are spreading the message of LOVE in the various parts of the world. This within itself is compliance with the teachings of Jesus in the 28th chapter of Matthew, verse 19, where He says (Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you.)

**CONCLUSION:** In my conclusion, I would like to sum up the theme in this manner:

There are some phases of world affairs where Religion has absolutely no Relationship, whereas, on the other hand, there are certain phases of world affairs where Religion is very closely related.

I feel that in view of the great need for Religion in all world affairs, that we as Christians and Missionaries should try to do more towards helping to promote this great cause of kingdom building in the world, that we may be able to hear the welcome voice of Jesus saying well done when we reach the end of our journey.

**WILLIAMSTON** — Dr. Howard Thurman, Dean of Marsh Chapel, Boston University, delivered the E. S. Hayes Commencement address at the gymnasium Tuesday evening at 8 p. m.

The eloquent dynamic speaker began his most thought provoking address by quoting "No man is an island, No man is alone. Each man's joy is to me, Each man's dream is my own". Dr. Thurman continued by defining and giving the characteristics of freedom. He chose as a subject "Human Freedom".

He stated that freedom is a thing that everybody desires to have, but though personal freedom can't be manipulated as a personal device. Restoring that freedom is the ability of one to determine the future by his present activities, the speaker gave several examples of such behavior.

Throughout his address Dr. Thurman reminded the audience that our Constitution was formulated upon the principle that all men are of equal importance in the sight of God. He went on to tell of his experiences of seeing hungry children searching through garbage cans for food.

The speaker declared that when children are compelled to assume adult roles because of parent negligence they become crips for the rest of their lives.

Dr. Thurman concluded by challenging the students and audience with these words "whoever or whatever is able to control ones inside—can invariably control ones life."

Some sixty-six seniors received honors and scholarships presented by the principal, W. A. Helms. The audience was highly entertained with music from both the band and the choir.
