#### **A&T Receives Chemical Money**

GREENSBORO - A grant of \$117.700 has been awarded to A&T College by the National Science Foundation to continue operation. beginning next September, of the Academic Year Institute for High School Chemistry Teachers.

Announcement of approval of the grant was made this week by Dr. L. C. Dowdy, acting president of the college.

He said the Institute is designed for participation by experienced chemistry teachers in full-time study while on leave from their regular teaching duties.

Dr. Dowdy said the objectives of the Institute are: to raise the level of science subject matter understanding of science teachers, including those who have not recently mpleted an adequate chemistry major, but who would otherwise be good prospects for the M. S. degree in chemistry, to improve their understanding of the scientific methods through exposure to research techniques, and to raise a few of the participants to the level of sci-

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

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
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
