### Human Rights Sets Dec. Meet

CHAPEL HILL — The North Carolina Council on Human Relations is scheduled to convene at the Carolina Inn, December 18. McNeil Smith, Greensboro, will deliver the principal address. He has served as the chairman of the N. C. Advisory Committee to the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights. It is to be remembered that this committee has made some startling disclosures on the work being done in the field of human rights in the state. It has pointed out that the matter of equal opportunities for Negroes is still being tossed back and forth with very little being done to improve the status of the Negro as it applies to job opportunities, housing and policy making. The educational system that he has long been exposed to is also being quoted as being far too inadequate to make the Negro capable and efficient to hold jobs requiring the best training and skill. The Rev. Henry G. Ruark of Rocky Mount, chairman of the council, will preside at the meeting. The council, formerly the N. C. Commission on Interracial Cooperation, is a non-partisan, non-demonstrational interracial organization.

### Green Bay's Scoring Ace

In an era of football specialization, Green Bay Packers halfback Paul Hornung remains a triple-threat man. In 1961, he ran, passed and kicked his way to the Player of the Year title of the National Football League. This year, he appears well on his way to breaking the 176-point league scoring record he set in 1960.  
Records are nothing new to this 6-foot 2-inch, 218-pound back from Louisville, Ky. At Notre Dame in 1957, he led in passing, rushing, scoring, kickoff and punt returns. He was an All-American choice in his junior year, repeated the honors as a senior—and was awarded the Heisman Trophy.
