as Kennedy, 33. Sneed was given 11 months and 29 days in jail and a \$100 fine for conspiracy, and six months and \$50 fine for aiding and abetting prostitution. Granberry drew an 11 months and 29 days sentence for conspiracy. Throne was sentenced to 11 months and 29 days and fined \$100 for conspiracy.

Kennedy was given six months and fined \$50 for aiding and abetting prostitution.

The four were sentenced by Judge John L. Draper in criminal court. Assistant District Atty. Gen-eral Howard Butler made much of the carryings-on between the Ne-groes and whites involved, indicating that abortions and suicide attempts had resulted. Defense attorneys announced


