Rock 'N' Roll Artists Jailed And Fined

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (ANP) — Sentenced to fines totaling \$300 and three year jail terms for indulging in interracial sex parties four men, including two rock 'n' roll singers, and William Throne, 32, and Thomas Kennedy, 33.

Sneed was given 11 months and 29 days in jail and a \$100 fine for conspiracy, and six months and \$50 fine for aiding and abetting in prostitution. Granberry drew an 11 months and 29 days sentence for conspiracy. Throne was sentenced to 11 months and 29 days and fined \$100 for conspiracy.

Kennedy was given six months and fined \$50 for aiding and abetting prostitution.

The four were sentenced by Judge John L. Draper in criminal court. Assistant District Atty. General Howard Butler made much of the carry-overs between the Negro and white involved, indicating that abortions and suicide attempts had resulted.

Defense attorneys announced they would file petitions within 30 days to have the sentences suspended. Meanwhile, the four defendants were released under \$1,000 bonds.

The names of the white girls, two of whom turned state witnesses, were withheld.

The defendants pleaded guilty to the charges before all-male all-white jury.

Both Judge Draper and Butler said the charges stemmed from a series of interracial "petting" and sex parties. Butler said two of the white women described the affairs as a "series of petting parties, drinking parties and, in some instances, nude parties."
