CHICAGO (AP)—As it was expected, the voting was close for the most valuable player award in the National League. But in view of his remarkable record of 104 steals on the basepaths—and the accompanying value of his thievery to the Los Angeles Dodgers — is begrudging the honor that nestles with Maury Wills.

We don't think Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants, nor Tommy Davis, a Willie's teammate are green with envy because the balloting went Maury's way. Either Mays or Davis would have worn the most valuable player award with distinction—and most deservedly.

The fact that the first four players in the NL MVP election were tan athletes is renewed confirmation of the eminent of the status of our men in baseball. Wills bagged eight first place votes, Mays seven, Davis three and Frank Robinson, of the Cincinnati Reds and last year's winner, one. There were 20 votes cast.

"I'm delighted. It feels great. This is best award a player can get," said Wills in Spokane, Wash., where he now makes his home.

The one-time Washington, D. C., high school athlete has joined the ranks of many fine tan players who have been acclaimed the most valuable in the NL. None has attained the distinction in the American League.

Jackie Robinson, of course, was the first (1949). Roy Campanella won it three times. Ernie Banks, twice. Singleton's honors have gone to Mays, Don Newcombe, Henry Aaron and Frank Robinson.

Wills stole 104 bases, breaking Ty Cobb's record of 96 for a single season. Maury, however, played in 165 games, including the extra contests because of NL expansion and the three playoffs games in which the Dodgers lost the pennant to the Giants.

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
