## Rams Are Cream Of CIAA Crop

WINSTON-SALEM — A brash team of hot shooters and fast movers, The Winston-Salem Teachers Rams are off to a perfect start in defense of their Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association basketball championship.

The Rams have opened their season with three straight CIAA victories — trouncing Elizabeth City 105-81, edging by Livingstone 77-71 and downing North Carolina Col-

lege 90-70. In addition, they beat NCC in the finals of the CIAA Tip-Off Tourney Saturday night.

Back in their best shooting form are the scoring twins of two seasons ago, Richard Glover and Willie Curry. Glover led the Rams in scoring last year and is topping the team once more. Curry, a left-handed set shot artist, is not far behind Glover.

Floor generals for the Rams is

5-11 and still growing sophomore Ted Blunt. Another good shooter on the team is Barney Hood, who often breaks into the starting five.

Gaines is hoping for rebounding power from lanky 6-7 Ted Ratchford, a sophomore. Lack of experience is his weakness, but he is showing improvement in each game.

Winston-Salem has its most rugged schedule in a number of seasons. They will play in three special tournaments. Their big test will come Dec. 21 and 22 in Terre Haute, Ind. in the Interstate Classic at Indiana State.

The Rams will play Indiana State Dec. 21 and Ball State Dec. 22. They defeated Indiana State last March at the NAIA national in Kansas City, Mo. Indiana State invited Winston-Salem to play in its annual Interstate Classic at which Ball State is co-host. Western Illinois is the fourth team in the classic.

Winston-Salem will be host to its own Holiday Festival Tournament Dec. 28 and 29. Competing teams will be Johnson C. Smith, A&T and North Carolina College, all top teams in the CIAA.

## Grambling Routes Paul Quinn 80-56

GRAMBLING, La. — Paul Quinn College chased Grambling in futile disgust last Monday night as the salient-laden Tigers bombarded the Texans, 80-56.

Six players hit in double figures for Coach Fred Hobdy and their work beneath the boards drew swelling rounds of applause.

The Tigers hit 36 of 78 shots from the floor for a 46 percent average. Grambling out rebounded Paul Quinn, 63-30.

Willis Reed was the top scorer with 20 points and 20 rebounds. Donald Higgs was the visitors' top scorer with 16 points.

## Grambling's "Superman" Picks Dallas

GRAMBLING, La. — When the American Football League selected Big Junior Buchanan as its top draft choice, it demonstrated conclusively that small-college football can open the proper professional grid doors.

Junior is a mans man — a 6-7, 273 pound giant — big enough to play the whole line by himself, fast enough to play halfback and smart enough to be named to the All-American academic team during his junior year.

And, he has a mind like a computer. He remembers everything he has seen and heard about the sport.

This modern-day Goliath is a physical education major, but he knows a little jungle psychology too, according to Robinson, a whimsical home-spun dressing room philosopher. He says in his dry wit, "kill 'em before they kill you."

Buchanan considers it a personal affront to give up a yard and refuses to be associated with teammates who can't block and tackle.

Dallas scout Don Klosterman calls Buchanan the "greatest line prospect extant. If there's a better line man in college I want to see him."

As the first small-college player honored with the No. 1 selection in a professional draft, he is ideally suited for his pioneering role.

Coaches have nominated Buchanan on the ground of unique qualifications. They claim that "He looks and acts like Superman."

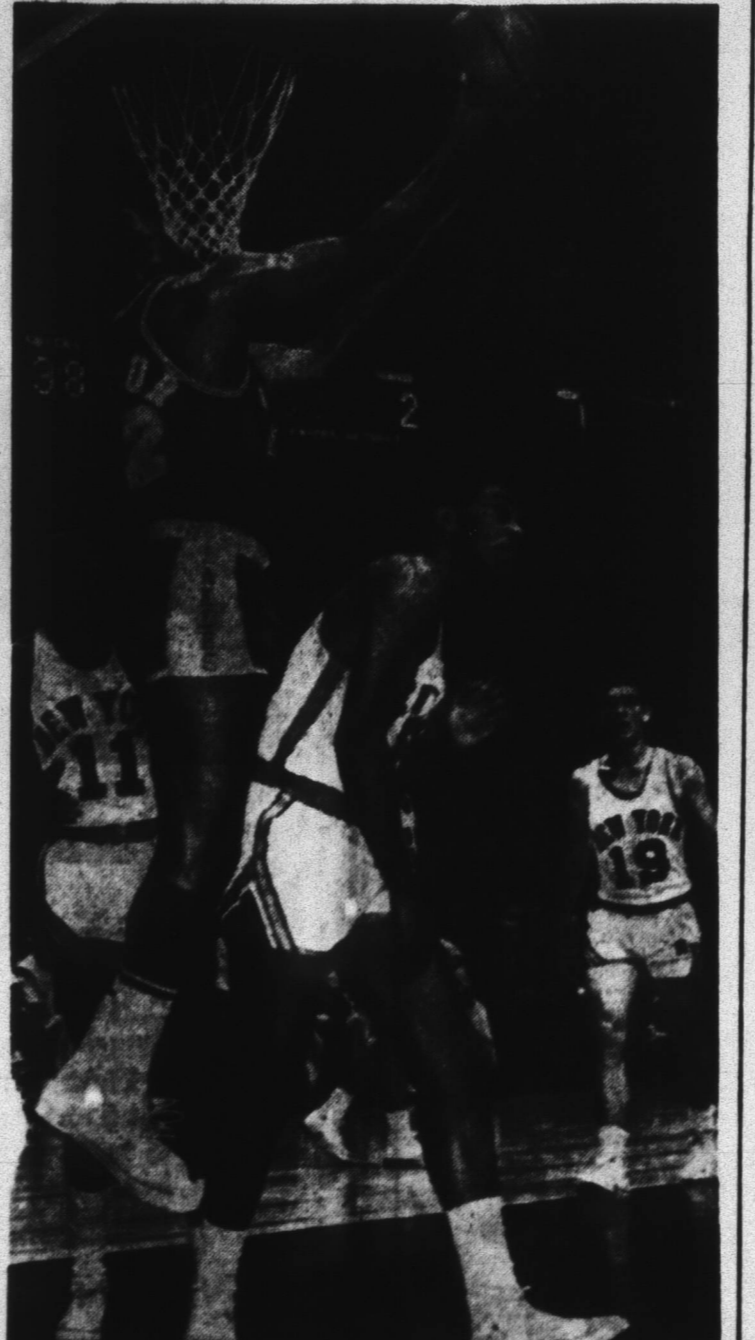

Other outstanding players in the Shaw victory included Ira Mitchell, James Hall, Haywood Mays and Carroll Purcell.
