Charges Dropped

The right to set up restrictions as to who will sit in the dining room of the State House got a setback in City Court Monday, when Solicitor Bob Hedrick dropped charges, brought by Eddie Wall, county constable and an assistant sergeant-at-arms, against three students for what he termed trespassing when he found them sitting in a "restricted" area, last week.

Pizantia. The case is said to be under investigation, due to a warrant having been sworn to by the girl.

Driver Misses Dog Kills Two People

GOLDSBORO — There are those who will turn around when a black cat crosses their path. It might have been that if Emmitt Boykin of Cayuga had stopped when he sighted a dog in the path of a car he was driving, he would have avoided the death of two persons and would

not have received injuries himself. From the Wayne Memorial Hospital he told investigating officers that in his attempt to miss the dog, he lost control of the car, while rounding a curve and hit the abutment of a bridge, about 9:15 p. m. Saturday night, killing his girl friend, Miss Lilly Carol Miller and a companion, Gerald Lynwood Ezell, both of Rt. 4, Mount Olive.

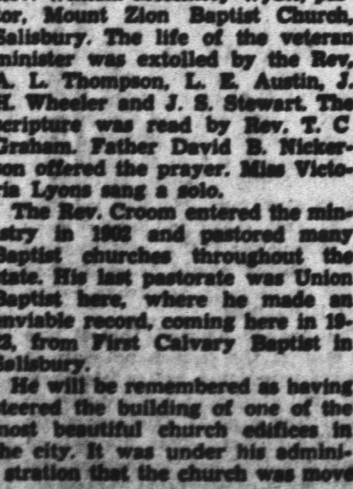
Veteran Pastor Buried In Durham

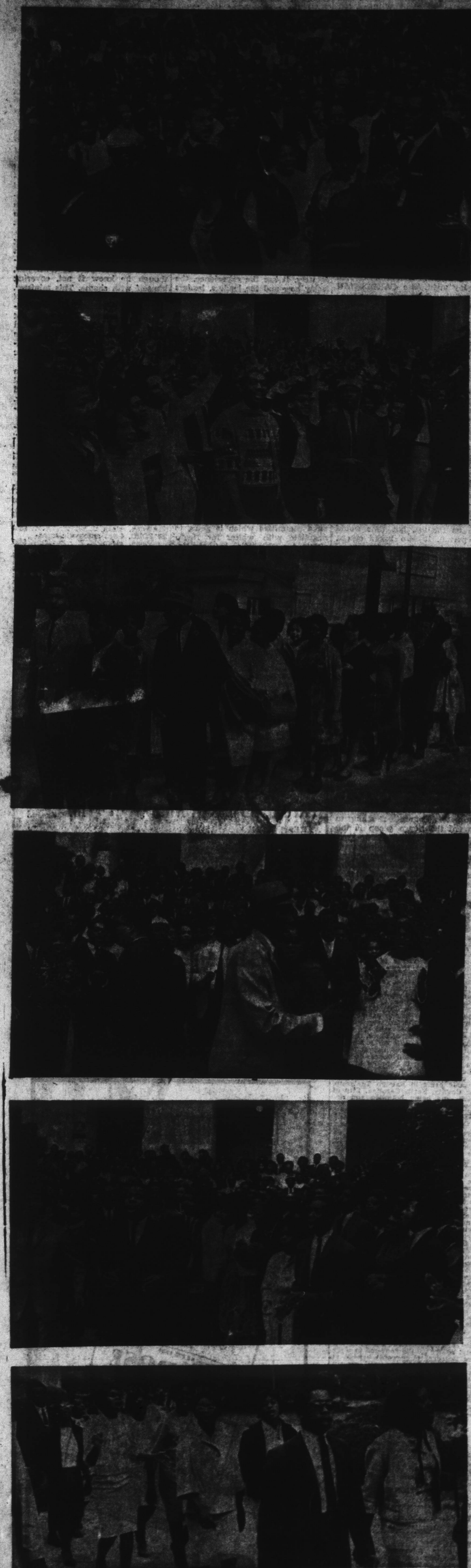
