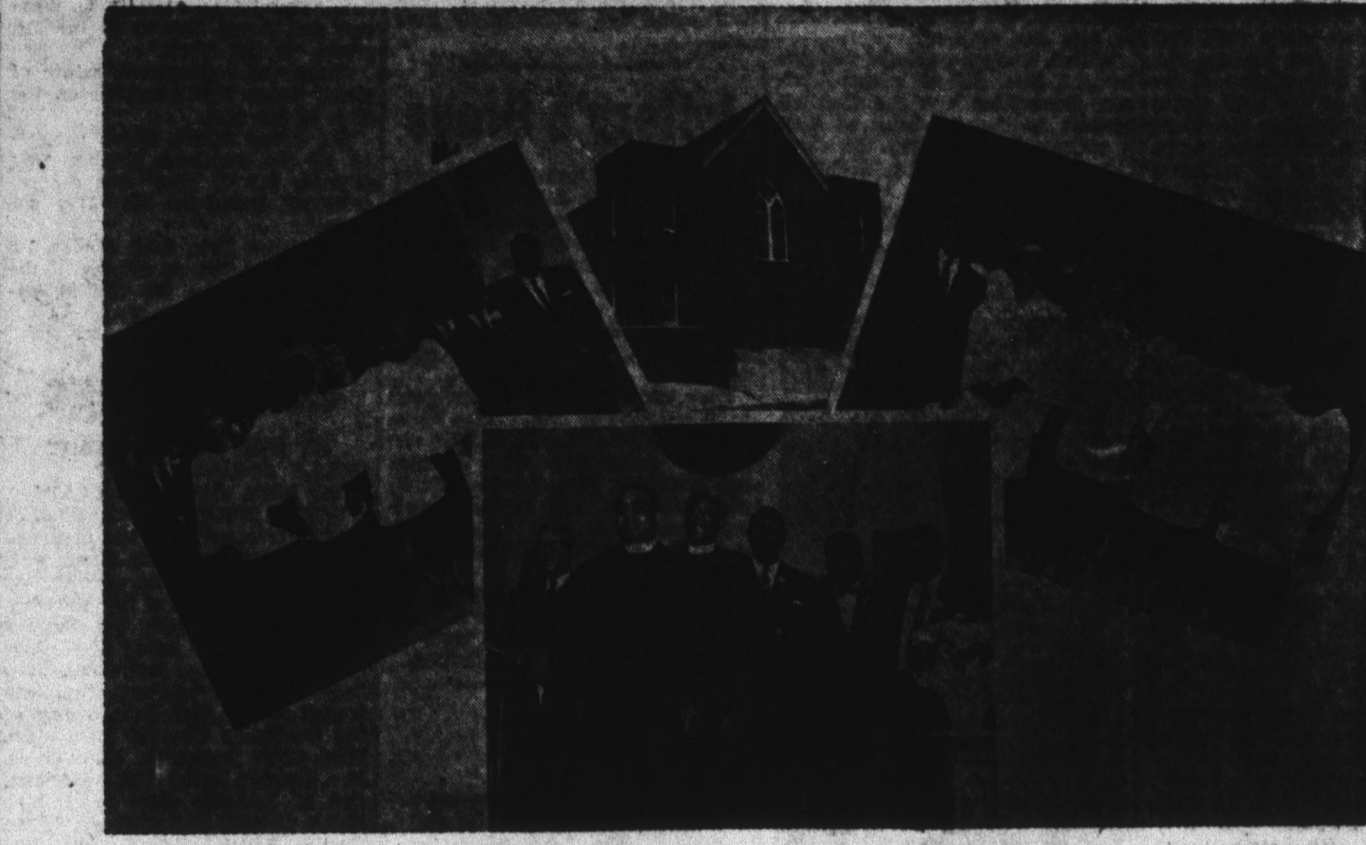

St., Saturday afternoon.

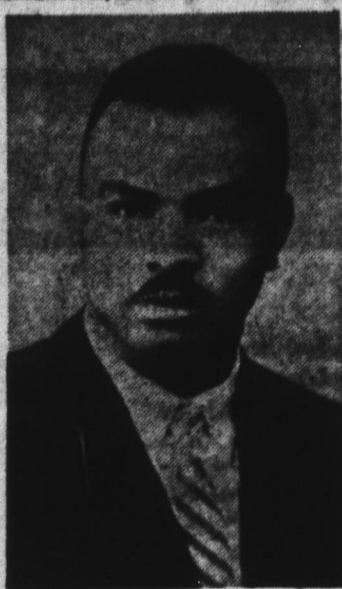
**Announces
