Charlotte Boy Revived By Quick-Acting Medic Jones, 16, owes his "second life"

The youth was placed in an ele-vator and was on his way up to the operating room when his heart suddenly stopped beating. The Iraqui physician, Dr. Akram Najib, a resident doctor at the hos-Jones, 16, owes his "second life" to an Iraqui physician. Young Jones reportedly "died" at the Charlotte Memo-rial Hospital early last Thurs-day morning after a knife was thrust into his heart as a result of a fight at the Oaklawn Com-munity Center in Charlotte.
