

Release Of 4 Denied By A Judge

AMERICUS, Ga. — A Superior Court Judge here last week denied a defense attorney's motion for release of three civil rights workers facing charges which carry the death penalty.

Judge T. O. Marshall turned down a writ of habeas corpus filed by Albany attorney C. B. King on behalf of Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee field workers Don Harris, a Negro, Ralph Allen and John Perdue, both white.

They are held without bond on state charges of "attemp-

ing to incite insurrection," a capital offense which carries a possible death penalty.

Thomas McDaniel, a local Negro youth arrested with the SNCC workers during a singing demonstration on August 8, must also remain in jail as a result of Judge Marshall's decision.

McDaniel is held under \$20,000 bond on charges of unlawful rioting, unlawful assembly, obstruction of a lawful arrest and assault and battery.

The NAACP said it was forced to take the unusual action in favor of the racist because the rights of Negroes to free speech and to assemble peacefully and to demonstrate also hinge on the outcome of the case.

If the convictions, based on an Alabama state court injunction barring the group from holding a meeting in Fairfield, Ala., is permitted to stand, the NAACP, the Justice Department and the ACLU argue, it would give Southern segregationist officials a license for also curbing the free speech and rights of Negroes.

The NAACP pointed out that the order forbidding the states' righters to speak was similar to injunctions now being used against Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and others opposed to segregation. The NAACP noted further that the contempt finding against the eight was already being used against Negroes.

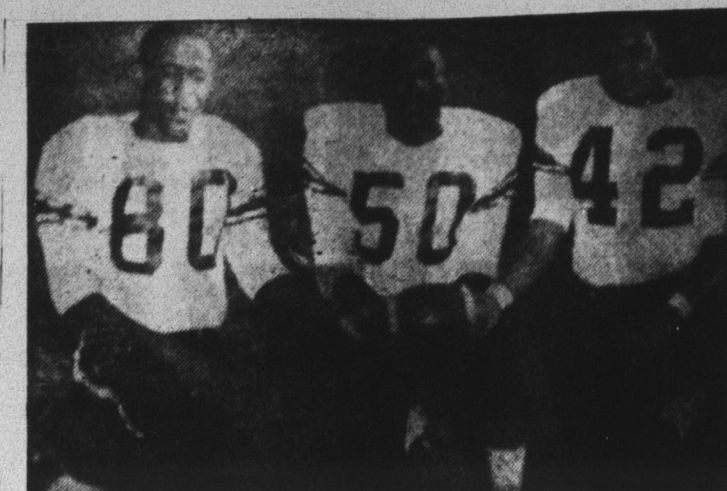
