A-The VA is required by Originally, there were several organizations that served law to pay the insurance proveterans in various ways. One of the earliest of these was the Bureau of Pensions. The Bureau of Wat Bisk ceeds to the last designated beneficiary in writing to the Insurance originally insured wartime shipping (but later took over service to veterans. 
