'Grand Union' Of Choir Members Set

DURHAM - Some 200 alumni of the North Carolina College choir are expected to participate in the organization's first Grand Reunion on the NCC campus February 7-9.

Called "A Tribute to Sam," the observance will honor Samuel W. Hill, assistant professor of music and director of the choir, for his leadership of the group.

Clifton Wilson, a junior at NCC and chairman of the Reunion Committee, said that in addition to honoring Hill, "who has devoted so many years of work and tireless energy to the people of his choir," the reunion also has as its purpose the gathering of all choir members from 1949 to 1964 for "a weekend of reminiscing, fun, and paying tributes to outstanding alumni of the choir."

The three-day occasion, to which former choir members during the 15-year period will be invited, will begin Friday, Feb. 7, with registration from 1 to 6 p. m. in the Fine Arts Building. A concert by the college choir (open to the public) at 8:15 p. m. will be followed by a reception and a semi-formal dance.

Saturday's activities, which will begin with additional registration from 9-10 a. m., will be highlighted by a formal testimonial dinner and a formal ball in the evening.

Sunday's schedule includes an inspirational service at 10 a. m., a brunch in the Band Room, and a "Farewell to Sam."
