Thursday evening Mrs. Jeanne S. Moehn of the University of Maryland will discuss "Self-Who Am I?"

Dr. J. S. Himes of North Carolina College at Durham and Mr. Bourdeau of the University of Maryland will speak on the topic, "Mate Selection Process."

On Saturday, Feb. 1, Dr. Catherine T. Dennis, state supervisor of Home Economics Education and Mrs. Alice O. Pierce, executive director of the Family Service-Travelers Aid Association, will brief the audience on the subject, "The Family Today." Mrs. Elizabeth Middleton of North Carolina State University and Miss Grace Daniel of the State Board of Health are also scheduled to take part in Saturday's discussion.

Drive For Shaw University Funds Gaining Added Momentum Daily

Shaw University's emergency drive to raise \$300,000 by the end of June to liquidate its current operating indebtedness gained added momentum during the past week as the national alumni association, several church groups in the state, and others took action to secure the necessary funds.

In an extraordinary session of the Executive Committee (representing alumni associations from across the country) of the national alumni, a plan was adopted for the alumni to raise \$50,000 within the next thirty days. Every alumni is being asked to contribute at least \$100.00 within this period, and several groups in northern cities have begun to contact corporations and other businesses for gifts.

Earlier in the week, Dr. James E. Cheek, president of Shaw, was informed that Dr. Leon C. Riddick, president of the General Baptist State Convention of New Jersey, a

Shaw alumnus, and Harold T. Graves, president of the Summit Trust Company, a trustee, had begun a drive to raise \$30,000 by the end of May.

Also, the Theological Alumni Association adopted a goal of \$20,000 to be realized by April 1, on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Theological Alumni Association.

Anticipating action to be taken on February 3, when the Executive Committee of the General Baptist State Convention will convene in Raleigh in a special session called by the President, Dr. R. M. Pitts, four churches this past Sunday raised a combined total of \$4,280.62. At the First Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, Dr. David R. Hedzley, minister, \$2,000 was raised after Dr. Cheek's appearance as guest speaker on Sunday afternoon in Fayetteville. Four churches reported a total of \$2,280 after Dr. Cheek's presentation of the school's present needs

and future prospects to an audience at First Baptist Church, Dr. C. R. Edwards, minister.

Dr. Cheek reports that all indications lead him to believe that after the action taken by the state church body on February 3, the Baptist Churches of North Carolina will raise a total of \$100,000.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary, Mrs. M. A. Horne, president, had already pledged to raise \$50,000 in the drive.

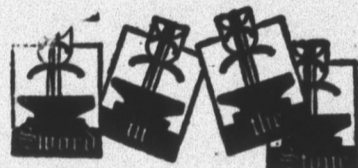
