

BABY SITTING

GARDENING the easy way

Indoor Greenery

Gardening need not be exclusively an activity for the great outdoors. Homeowners, as well as the apartment dwellers, can enjoy gardening, indoors, particularly in cooler weather.

Growing house plants can be a very satisfying indoor gardening experience, if you bear in mind a few simple precautions. Terra cotta pots are usually best for your plants. They're porous and allow the soil to absorb air. To prevent water-logging and rotting of roots, make sure the pots have holes in the bottom and are set in saucers for proper drainage. Most people tend to over-water house plants. Remember, the soil should be kept moist, but not wet. Generally, watering twice a week will be enough.

If your plants begin yellowing between the leaf veins they are very likely suffering from iron deficiency or anemia. Prompt attention is needed to cure this anemia.

A simple, effective and economical method is now available through the latest research. One-quarter of a teaspoon of Geigy Sequestrene 330 Fe iron chelate per quart of water, applied in a normal watering, is the recommended prescription.

N. C. State Ag School Gets New Name Feb. 1

The School of Agriculture, the oldest school at North Carolina State, gets a new name on Feb. 1. The new name, approved by the University Trustees' Executive Committee, will be the School of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

Dr. H. Brooks James, dean of the school said the new name reflects the increasing importance of the biological or life sciences.

The School of Agriculture has been developing program in such life sciences as genetics, zoology, plant pathology, entomology, botany and bacteriology.

Dean James pointed out that while these sciences form the basis for much of modern agriculture, their importance is not limited to agriculture.

James quoted University of California Chancellor Clark Kerr as saying the second half of the 20th life sciences.

Parents Of 12 Children Arrested After Five Run Away To Nice Home

LOS ANGELES (ANP) — "Please don't make us go home—we like our new house better," pleaded five runaway children discovered living in a make shift hovel five feet, three inches high on a vacant lot in Compton. Police say a deputy, Russell Owens, became suspicious when the oldest runaway, Linda Mason, 13, was observed carrying a bucket of water from a service station. Following her, he came upon the shelter which also housed Joyce, 12, Janice, 7, Samuel, 10, and Richard, 8.

According to the children's story, all 12 were kept hidden in the house and not even permitted to go to school. We never had a Christmas tree in our life," Linda told officers at the Firestone Sheriff's station.

Arrested on charges of child neglect were the father and mother, Samuel Mason, 39, and Dorothy, 37. The remaining children ranged in ages from 15 to pre-school tots.

The children claimed they slept on the floor and were fed only once a day. They were housed at McLaren Hall, pending the Masons' trial. Mason gave his occupation as a saxophone player.
