was willing to invest in education. "Students go to the Great Moscow University tuition free and these students receive stipends so that they can spend their full time studying. Every other store in the Soviet Union is a bookstore. Peo-ple on the subways read serious books, not dime store novels."

"If we are going to accept the kind of leadership role that we oughht to, we must give more than lip service to education. We don't even trust our neighbors even those who seem to be close to us. We cannot ignore the relationship between our role in this area and in education," she stated.
