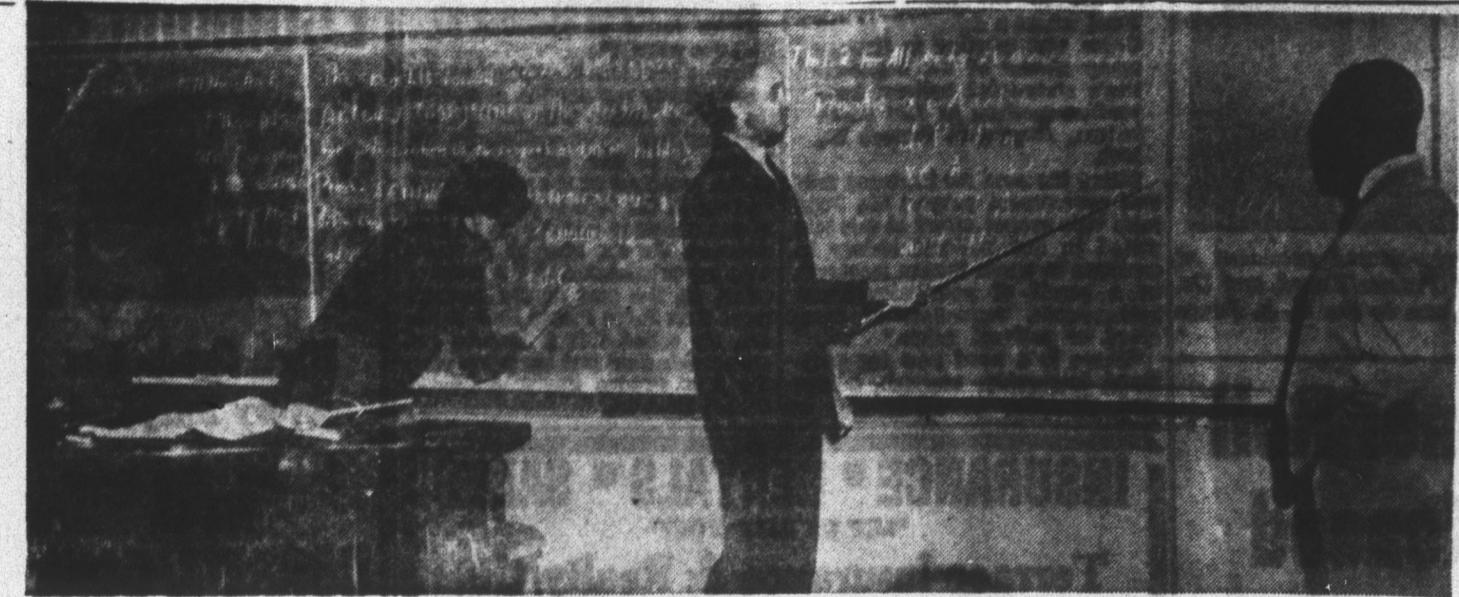

**Shaw Grad Succumbs In Salem, Va.**

**SALEM, Va.** — Dr. William Rufus Brown of 319 Colorado Street, Salem, Va. died recently at a hospital in Roanoke.

He was an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist in Roanoke and was a member of the staff of Bur-

nell Memorial Hospital where he was head of his department. He had served as staff chief, member of trustee board, was past president of the Magic City Medical Society, held membership in the Old Dominion Medical Society, National Medical Association.

He was also a member of the Roanoke Academy of Medicine, the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, the YWCA; John Wesley Methodist Church where he was serving as chairman of the trustee board. He was president of the Methodist Men and was chairman of sponsors of the Boy Scout Troop connected with the church.

Dr. Brown was a graduate of Shaw University, and received his degree in medicine from the Leonard Medical School, then connected with Shaw. He received his graduate degree from the New York Ophthalmic College, in New York City, and had done graduate work in Chicago at Cook County Hospital; in Jamesville, Wis.; in New York and Port Maine.

He lived a long and fruitful life and did much good for the people through his practice of medicine for more than 50 years, serving at one time as chairman of the board of health of Roanoke county, chairman of the Theron Williams Community Center's committee; officer of the Civic League and the Salem Credit Union and other organizations.

Dr. Brown was born in the British West Indies and came to this country at an early age. He leaves a devoted wife, Mrs. Mary Evans Brown, a number of nieces and nephews and other relatives.

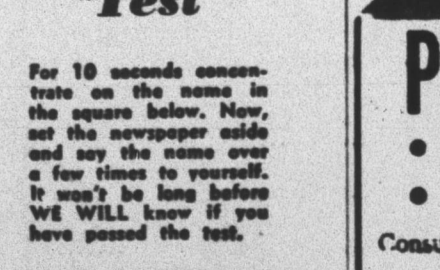
