Bennett History Major Woodrow Wilson Fellow

GREENSBORO — Miss Linda Powell, of Goldsboro, a senior history major at Bennett College, has been appointed a Woodrow Wilson Fellow for first-year graduate study next fall, it was announced last week.

"The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, which is dedicated to developing college teachers for tomorrow," is the largest private source of support for advanced studies in the liberal arts in North America," Sir Hugh Taylor, president, declared, in announcing that 1577 college seniors in the U. S. and Canada were named to receive this year's grants.

A Woodrow Wilson Fellow is granted full tuition and fees for the first year at the graduate school of his choice, as well as a stipend of \$1,800 and dependency allowances. This year's winners were chosen from over 11,000 college seniors representing a total of 904 colleges

and universities. Miss Powell, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Powell, Sr., and valetictorian at Dillard High School in Goldsboro, has also been awarded a \$650 Leroy Allen Scholarship by Pi Gamma Mu, national social science honorary society.

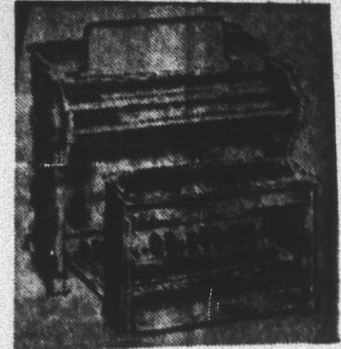

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Stay In School, Commissioner Advises Youths

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP) — Commissioner John Duncan, the only Negro member of the District of Columbia Board of Commissioners, last week urged more than 450 youngsters to remain in school and obtain the education in order to prepare themselves to become leaders of the future. He was the principal speaker at the 16th annual Youth Conference sponsored by the Beta Zeta chapter of the Zeta Phi Beta sorority, Inc., at the Eugene C. Meyer Elementary school. The theme of the conference, attended by youngsters ranging in ages from 6 to 12, was "Youth's Responsibility in a Free World."

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Drawing from the theme, Commissioner Duncan told the youngsters that they are the future leaders of their nation, community and homes, and that by staying in school and taking advantage of every opportunity to learn, they will be able to obtain the kinds of jobs that will enable them to become efficient citizens.

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
