

DR. W. C. McNEILL

Practiced Medicine 50 Years:

Dr. W. C. McNeill, 86. Dies In Washington

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Dr. Wil- | tired from teaching in 1943. liam C. McNeill, 86, retired physician, 5715 6th St., N. W., died on Saturday evening, April 11, at Freedman's Hospital after a short illness. One of ten children, Dr. McNeil public schools of the District and was born in Lake Waccamaw, N. later served 12 years on the Board C. in 1878. He came to Washington of Education of the District of Co-

in 1897 to attend Howard Academy. a preparatory school, and after graduation entered the Howard University School of Medicine in 1900. A self-taught typist and stenographer, he worked his way through the school as secretary to Dr. Furman J. Shadd, then secretary of the school. After his graduation in 1904,

he set up private practice which continued for fifty years, and in 1905 was appointed as first assistant surgeon at Freedman's Hospital. When Dr. Shadd resigned from the Medical School in 1908 because of ill health.

Dr. McNelli succeeded him as secretary-treasurer. He was also professor of gynecology, in charge of the gynecological ward of the hospital and director of the out-patient gynecolo-gical clinic.

As secretary-treasurer of the Howard School of Medicine, he helped spark the campaign to raise the \$250,000 endowment which enabled the school to meet the requirement. of the Association of American Medical Colleges. With money urgently needed to maintain and improve the school's standards, the University's trustees authorized the medical faculty to solicit donations for an endowment fund in 1911. Dr McNeill went to New York to present the situation to the General Education Board, which was established with money from the Rockefeller Fundation.

In 1919, the alumni of Howard University subscribed \$10,000 and a second appeal was made to the General Education Board, which spproved a conditional gift of \$250, 000, provided the medical faculty raised a like amount. Eventually, the school obtained the \$500,000 needed to meet the prescribed standards. Speaking of him, Dr. Edward A. Ballock, a former dean, said. "I know that he has the affection of every member of the Faculty for his devotion to the School and its best interest. That the School stands where it does in the medical world is due more to him than any one man."

Dr. McNeill left his administrative post in 1920 but continued teaching at Howard University until he re-

Dr. McNeill married Mary Alice Wheeler of Hartford, Connecticut, in 1910. She taught German in the lumbia.

He was the founder of Epsilon Boule of the Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity and served as both Sire Archon and Grand Sire Archon. He was also a charter member of Chi Delta Mu, a medical, pharmaceutical and dental fraternity.

Dr. McNeill is survived by two sons, Major Robert H. McNeill, 5715 6th Street, NW, and William C. McNeill, Jr., serving with the Agency for International Development, Kabul, Afghanistan; a daughter, Mrs. Katherine Walker, New York City; five grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Hines, Wilmington, N. C.; Mrs. Beulah Nurse, Sharon Hill, Pa., and Miss Bertha C. McNeil, 2645 15th Street, NW; a brother Dr. Oliver H. McNeil, Annapolis, Md.

Dr. McNeill was the brother of the late Mrs. Mary Alice Jervay of Wilmington, N. C.
