Practiced Medicine 50 Years:
Dr. W. C. McNeill, 86, Dies in Washington

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Dr. William C. McNeill, 86, retired physician, 5715 6th St., N. W., died on Saturday evening, April 11, at Freedmen's Hospital after a short illness. One of ten children, Dr. McNeill was born in Lake Waccamaw, N. C. in 1878. He came to Washington in 1897 to attend Howard Academy, a preparatory school, and after graduation entered the Howard University School of Medicine in 1900. A self-taught typist and stenographer, he worked his way through the school as secretary to Dr. Furman J. Shadd, then secretary of the school.
