the A.B. degree from Howard University (the LL.B. from Terrill Law School and Howard University Law School). In 1963 he was awarded the Honorary Degree LL.D. by Livingstone College at Salisbury.

Dr. Duncan comes from a family of educators—his father was a college president, his mother a public school teacher. A brother, Dr. Samuel E. Duncan, is president of Livingstone College, a sister, Miss Julia B. Duncan, registrar-treasurer of the same institution; and others are leaders in public schools and government.

Dr. Duncan's present civic activities include: Vice-president, Council of Churches, National Capital Area; Director, United Givers Fund, National Capital Area; Director, Big Brothers of the National Capital Area, Inc. and Chairman, Personnel Committee; trustee, Barney Neighborhood House, and Sponsor, Club of All Nations. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of John Wesley A. M. E. Zion Church.

He is married to the former Miss Edith L. West. They have two children, John Jr., age 19, and Joan W., age 15.
