HAMPTON INSTITUTE, Va.—"Pressures on college students for achievement are apt to have tragic consequences," Dr. Thomas Freeman, national president of Alpha Kappa Mu honor fraternity, told a Tuesday evening.

The occasion was Scholarship Night, arranged by Kappa Delta chapter of the fraternity, with Miss Edith Parker, president of the local unit, in charge of the program.

Miss Carole Jeanne Cousins, home economics major, and Lucius Wright, majoring in the division of technology, received the James E. Gregg prize "for having made the best use of their opportunities."

Winners of other scholarships awarded by campus sororities, fraternities and clubs, had been previously announced.

A special citation was presented to the Tutorial club, a group of students who give many hours of volunteer service in helping fellow students to study.

Dr. Freeman cited statistics to show that undue emphasis on achieving high grades in college forces students into dependency, suicide, and, at the very least, consulting psychiatrists or mental health services.

"Pressures on today's college student are of many kinds," he said. "Parents, teachers, fellow students, the climate of society all have their impact on a student's ambitions," he stated.
