

Fetchit, whose slow-moving, lazy, scarry roles drew strong protests from the NAACP and other civil rights groups, stated in one of his recent night club acts that he made close to \$7 million from his movie

He did not explain what happened to the fortune, except to say that suits and lived in a mansion with servants.

Recently, Fetchit switched his nightclub roles to singing, dancing and humor. But the films in which he typified the grovling type Negro, always subservient to whites, remained to haunt him.
