Over 2,500 Attend Grand Opening Of Peebles' New Charcoal Flame Eatery

More than 2,500 people came to the opening of Peebles' Charcoal Flame Restaurant on Sunday, May 10. A grand and gala affair it was at this beautiful restaurant, as everyone enjoyed the fine foods served there on Sunday.
For those who came, they already know the kind of business it is; for those who could not come, here is a brief description of this exclusive Peebles' Charcoal Flame Restaurant:
It is located at 309 S. Wilmington St. The seating capacity is 65. Booths are light maple with seats trimmed in orange. White counter topping with chrome and orange top stools. The beautiful stainless steel back bar has more than 20 pieces to serve from. The kitchen is most modern with two experienced cooks and four waitresses to serve the public. The inside wall interior is light green with a white ceiling. Light green curtains hang across the front windows.
Peebles served more than punch

and sandwiches as previously advertised. All the food served Sunday was free, and included 200 lbs. of Smithfield country ham, 200 lbs. of sugar cured hams, 125 lbs. of barbecue, 250 prime rib roast beef, shrimp, oysters, deep sea scallops, 125 lbs. of turkey, 300 lbs. of potato salad, 150 lbs. tossed salad with cheese dressing. Desserts were pie and cake and grape fruit juice as an appetizer.
Mr. (Vic) Peebles said he always wanted a good first-class eating place and that is why he worked so hard at so many places, so that he could get the experience needed to operate a first-class place successfully.

Two College Student Get Frat Awards

GREENVILLE, S. C.—Two college students were presented the highest awards given by the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, at the annual meeting of the Fraternity's Sixth District, composed of chapters in North and South Carolina, held here last week.

Harvey Gantt, Charleston, S. C., who broke down racial barriers in higher education in South Carolina by gaining admission to previously all-white Clemson College and now a senior, was honored as "Citizen of the Year."
Jesse Jackson, Greenville, S. C., also a senior, honor student and president of the A&T College Student Government, received the "Omega Man of the Year" award.

He had distinguished himself as the leader of massive demonstrations against segregated public facilities in Greensboro, N. C., in becoming the first of his race to represent North Carolina at the annual convention of the Young Democrats Club of America, at Las Vegas, Nevada, and for leadership in national and state student organizations.
It was the first time in the history of the organization that two undergraduates had received the awards.
