The crowning ceremony which serves as a climax to another school year will be held in Raleigh's Memorial Auditorium at 8:00 p.m. On Sunday, May 31, the Reverend Percy High, a former graduate of Ligon will give the baccalaureate sermon in the school's auditorium. The exercise is scheduled to start at 3:00 p.m.  
Dr. Ray is a native of Raleigh, where he attended high school and received his B.A. degree from Shaw University.  
He earned the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Southern California.  
After his graduation from Shaw University, Dr. Ray taught English, French, and Social Studies at what is now C. F. Pope High School in Burgaw.  
Prior to joining NCC's faculty, Dr. Ray was a production control expeditor for an airplane company, a social worker for Los Angeles County, and a student assistant in English at USC.  
He also served as director of NCC's News Bureau and directed publicity for the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association before assuming his present position in 1960. Dr. Ray now devotes full time to his main professional interest, the teaching of language and literature.

Reverend High graduated from Ligon in 1959 and received his B.A. degree from Shaw University in 1963. He is currently completing his work for a Bachelor of Divinity degree at Union Theological School, Virginia Union University, in Richmond, while at Shaw, Mr. High was very active in student welfare activities and civic organizations.

The orator for July 4th should be one whose style would be apropos for the time when the colonists lived. He might build his speech around the bulwarks of freedom. What these bulwarks are will be task of the speaker, for surely he should have some ideas if he has thought the subject through and through.

**THE SPEECH OUTLINE**  
Too many people ramble while making speeches, and the cause may be traced to the lack of an outline. In preparing to make a talk, the speaker will find that an outline is most useful. If the address is speech is brief or short, an outline fifteen or more minutes long, an outline is almost a necessity. If the more desirable than none for beginning speaker.  
The outline may be considered the plan for your speech. It should not be too detailed, but it should contain enough to help you recall your major ideas. The outline is a very rough sketch of main line of explanation or argument. It will remind you of what comes next. It, by all means, should not be a completely written speech.  
The good outline will have a beginning, a middle, and an end. If you doubt the wisdom of this principle, recall some public speaker who just never seems to get started; while some speakers begin in the middle and end there.
