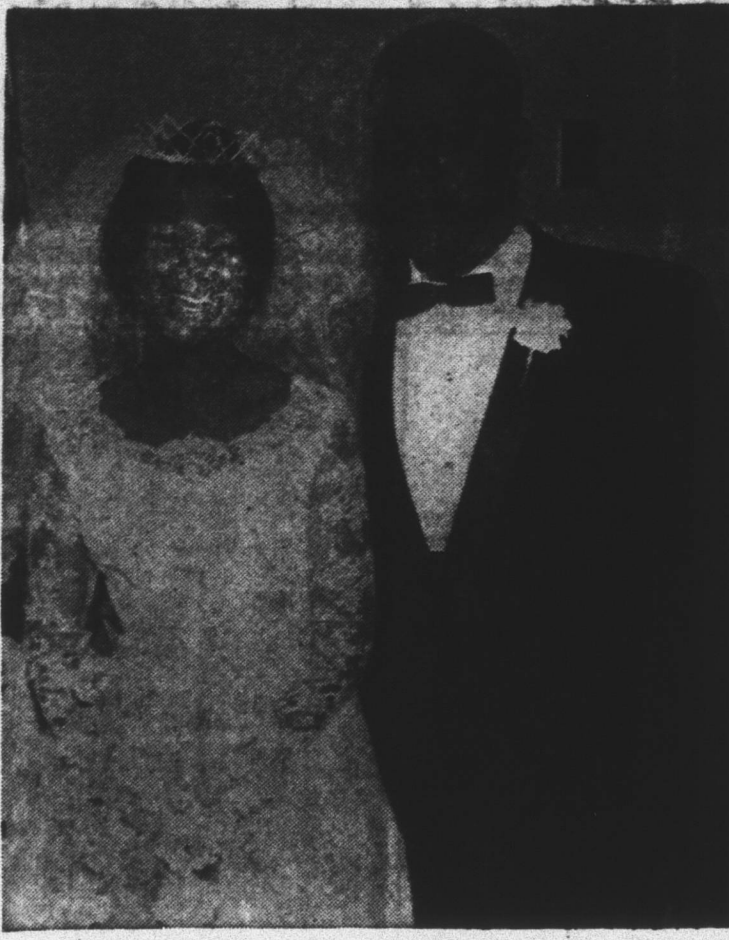
Salem, was best man. The bride's aunts, Mrs. Lovie M. Williams and Miss Lillie C. Birdsall gave the reception immediately following the wedding.
