Hill, relieving starter Joe Hunter in the fourth inning, was the winning pitcher.

Alonzo Patton had two singles and Clarence Allen a homer for

Wilmington.

Raleigh defeated Durham, 4-1, in the first round and beat Goldsboro, 5-4, in the Semifinals. Wilmington won its opening game from Charlotte by forfeit, then went on to defeat Fayetteville, 9-6, in eight innings.

In the opening win-over Durham, Joe Hunter, who hurled a six hitter, was ably helped by the two run home runs of Louis Powell and Theodore Powell.

In the semi-final game against Goldsboro, Joe Sanders belted two homers and William Hartsfield allowed only six hits.

## In 1st Game: Tan Rookie 2nd To Hit 2 Homers

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (NPI)—Berto Campaneris, Negro Cuban-born rookie, made his debut with the Kansas City Athletics a spectacular one last week, when he became the second man in modern baseball history to hit two home runs in his first major league game.

Campaneris hit second homer off Minnesota Twins pitcher Jim Katt in the seventh inning with a man on base, as the A's went on to defeat the Twins, 4-3.

Earlier, Campaneris had become the sixth player in major league history to hit a home run on the first pitch to him—also off Katt. Campaneris slugged both of his homers over the left field fence.

Campaneris also drove in three runs—with the two homers—hit a single, walked and stole a base, in his successful debut with the A's.

The A's had called Campaneris 21, from the minors to replace shortstop Wayne Causey, who had suffered a baseline injury.

Campaneris is said to have had a rocky childhood. He trained hard in his native Cuba to become a big league ball player, even tossing rocks with both hands to develop dexterity.

Even when Ernie was storming the bleachers with his homerun bats, he couldn't contribute enough to the Cubs in a series. His heroics included winning the National League's most valuable player award for two successive years, setting a record for homeruns hit by a shortstop, and fielding and slugging titles. He has broken every major Cup record. But all these achievements couldn't satisfy Ernie's ambition.

### Chicago's Mayor:

## Daley Terms Deaths Of Galimore, Farrington "Tremendous Loss To Bears And To The City"

CHICAGO (NPI) — Mayor Richard J. Daley Wednesday described the deaths of Chicago Bears stars Willie Galimore and John Farrington in an automobile accident Sunday night as "a tremendous loss" to the Bears and the City, and extended his condolences to the relatives of the two players.

The mayor's expression changed and he seemed somewhat somber as he commented on the double tragedies in answer to a question from this representative of the Negro Press International and the Chicago Defender at his press conference in City Hall.

"I think it is terrible," said

Daley, a sports fan who like to play for Chicago teams, that these two fine young men—Galimore and Farrington—who played such outstanding football for the Bears, that fine championship team, should die like this in the midst of their fine careers.

He added: "I extend to their families my condolences in their bereavement."

Galimore, former Florida A&M University star who was in his seventh year with the Bears, and Farrington, an end from Prairie View College in Texas, were killed when their car overturned as they were returning to the Bears training camp at Rensselaer, Ind.

Daley said he had seen Galimore and Farrington play and thought they were great. He said the city should be "grateful" to both.

Daley's comments came as arrangements were being made for funeral services for Galimore and Farrington in Rensselaer and in Florida and Texas. Galimore will be buried in Tallahassee and Farrington in Houston.

In reply to another NPI question, Daley indicated that his administration is not promoting any special program to head off racial violence here, but would instead help and encourage groups of organizations working to obtain racial justice and equality of opportunities for "all our citizens." He said for instance, that he had conferred with labor leaders and would continue to confer with them about creating employment opportunities.

He also credited the church operating for the most part, he said, through the Conference on Race and Religion, and civic and community groups with contributing largely to the racial calm here.

However, Daley refused to be drawn into lengthy comment or criticism of the racial riots in such places as Harlem (N. Y.) and Rochester, N. Y.

Daley reiterated a statement made in an exclusive interview for NPI and the Defender yesterday that full credit should go "to the people of Chicago of all groups and segments and races" for the lack of violence here.

"Maybe the city hasn't done as much as it should, but Chicago has always given opportunities to all minorities and this has had a great bearing on the situation," the mayor said.

### Withholding Recognition Of Match:

## Clay-Liston Backers "Don't Give A Hoot About WBA"

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (NPI)—Spokesmen for champion Cassius Clay and ex-heavyweight titlist Sonny Liston have virtually ignored the refusal of the World Boxing association to sanction the rematch between the two fighters, and said they would go ahead with the fight, with or without the WBA's blessings.

Clay and Liston in a marked departure from custom, signed contracts for the rematch in different cities early last week. The bout is to be held between Sept. 15 and Oct. 11. Clay signed in Louisville, while Liston signed in Philadelphia.

Cities most prominently named as likely sites are Louisville, Ky. and Las Vegas, Nevada. But the chairman of the Las Vegas athletic commission said the gambling capital doesn't need the fight.

After the signing was announced, WBA President Ed Lassman, Miami Beach, Florida—the man who had

previously sought to lift Clay's title for "conduct detrimental to boxing"—disclosed the association's opposition.

He said opposition to the match would continue until Clay and Liston explain the circumstances surrounding their Feb. 25 encounter when Cassius, following a long bout, upset Sonny to win the title.

Lassman also said he had invited the fighters to attend the WBA convention at Norfolk, Va., Aug. 26-30. Neither fighter has indicated a desire to attend.

## Clay Predicts Surprises In Liston Rematch

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Cassius Marcellus (Mohammed Ali) Clay, Jr., signed Monday night to meet dethroned world heavyweight boxing champion Charles (Sonny) Liston in a rematch this fall.

The bout is slated to take place sometime between September 15 and October 31, in either Las Vegas, Baltimore or Louisville, where Clay, "The Louisville Lip" would like to have it.

Both fighters are scheduled to receive 30 per cent of the gate.

Clay beat Liston in an upset as the latter failed to respond to the seventh round bell at Miami Beach, Fla. Liston claimed his shoulder was injured in the first round as the two pugns kept fighting after the bell.

## Braves' Carty Is Fighter On Baseball Field

MILWAUKEE (NPI) — Tan Rico Carty of the Milwaukee Braves team is a handy man with his dukes.

However, his talent for fist-fights was kept a virtual secret until he exploded two right crosses on the jaws of two New York Mets players recently.

Back in his native Santo Domingo next door to "Papa" Duvalier's Haiti, Rico was a pretty good fist fighter before he turned to baseball and found it a less painful and more lucrative means of earning his bread.

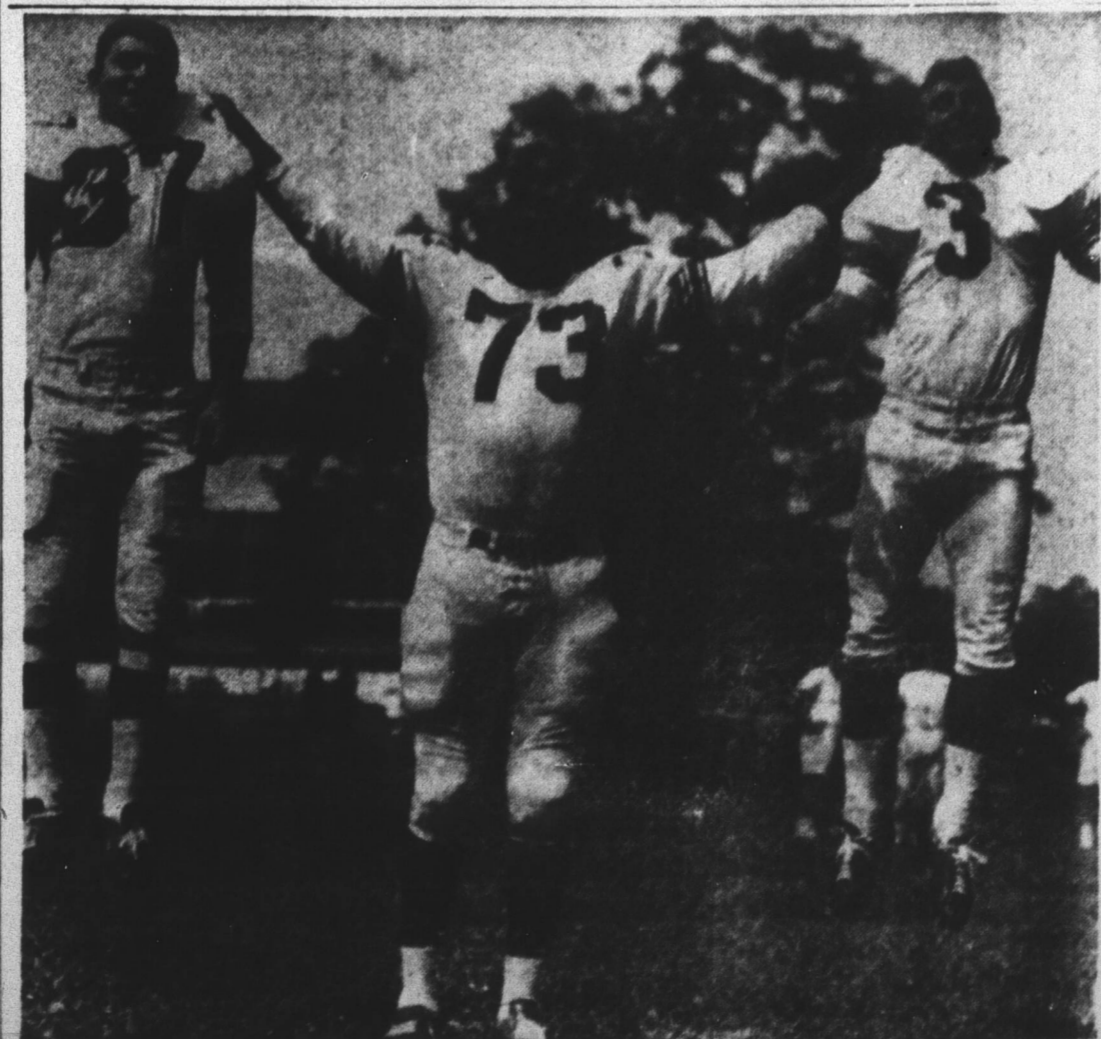
Rico was so good at duking, that he ran up a string of 17 straight victories as an amateur. But his first defeat came when he bent his athletic ambition elsewhere. "One time I lost, and I don't like to lose," said Carty explaining his decision in his struggle with Rico.

However, last Sunday, Rico found he couldn't resist indulging in pugilism again, if even for a short time.

Getting into a free-for-all that was started when Met's pitcher Frank Lary dusted Braves outfielder Lee Maye, Carty slugged New York's catcher Chris Cannizzaro right on the kisser, and then feinted and planted a similar punch on the jaw of first baseman Frank Thomas.

During the melee, the benches of both teams emptied onto the field, but wiser opponents stayed away from Carty, who by then was well warmed up for further fist-fights.

When order was finally restored, Carty was considered the winner, at least in the minds of the partisan 21,782 fans of the County Stadium action. The plate umpire, however, judged fist-fights to be distasteful during a Sunday afternoon of baseball and banished Carty from the second game of a doubleheader between the two teams. The Braves won both games, 11-7 and 15-10.
