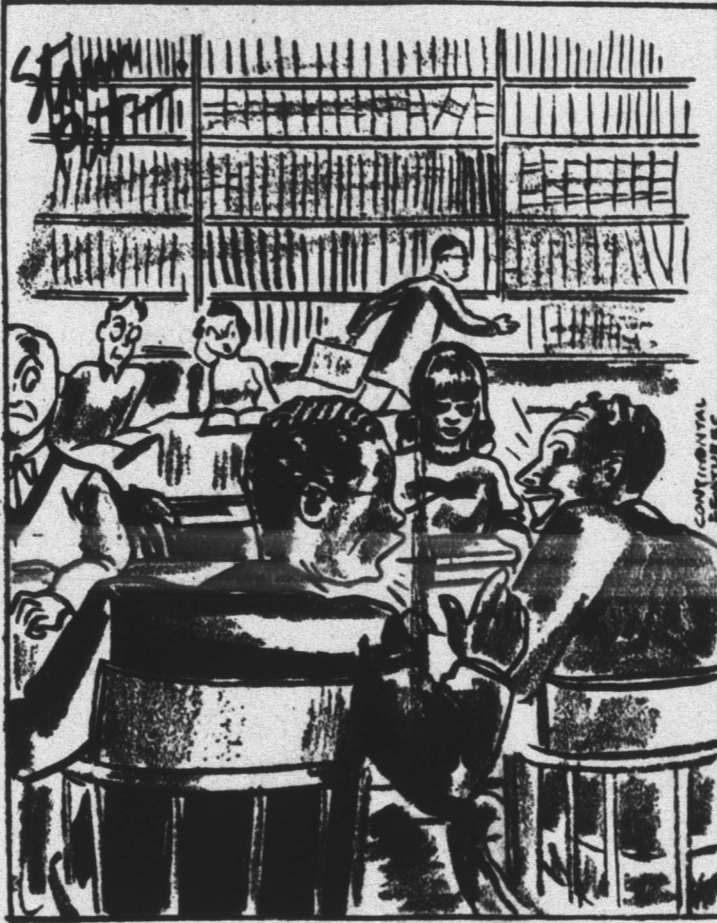

Achievements of nearly 200 North Carolina youths will be recognized at the annual 4-H Electric Congress in Asheville August 17-19. The congress, at which state and territorial winners in the 4-H electric program will be announced, is sponsored by the four electric power companies serving North Carolina and the Westinghouse Educational Foundation.
