Land Is Termed  
'Important'

DURHAM - North Carolina Col-  
lege officials, headed by President  
Samuel P. Massie, Jr., emphasized the  
college's need for more land and  
presented capital improvement  
budget requests totaling \$7,741,000  
for the 1965-67 biennium in a meet-  
ing last week with members of the  
State Advisory Budget Commission.  
Massie declared that land for the  
college's expansion "is our  
most urgent need if we are to  
move ahead."  
"We are now having to demolish  
current structures on the campus  
in order to build new ones, and  
most of the buildings we are de-  
stroying are still adequate," he said.  
Requesting \$290,000 for ad-  
ditional land, he stated he pro-  
posed purchases would increase  
the college's property from 53  
to 64 acres and would enable  
the institution to increase its  
student body from 2,500 to 3,000  
within the next three years.  
On the college's list of priority  
requests also were a new dormi-  
tory for 400 women costing \$1,500,  
000 and repairs and enlargement of  
the central heating plant costing  
\$200,000.  
Other requests, in order of their  
priorities, included air condition-  
ing for six buildings, \$460,000; a  
communications building, \$965,000;  
an addition to the science building,  
\$260,000; resurfacing of roads, \$10,  
000; and repairs to the gymnasium,  
\$40,000.

Notes on a Success Story:  
Hello, it's 4 p.m. time again - To-  
day's notes, "A Success Story on  
The Life of Jackie Robinson," were  
taken from an old Time Magazine.  
As the story goes, Jackie was a  
poor boy. He was one of five chil-  
dren, and encountered many difficul-  
ties in his early years. He showed  
signs of promise in baseball early  
in life but had a difficult road to  
travel. His first opportunity was  
with the Kansas Monarchs of the  
Negro League, with all forms of  
handicaps, shortcomings, sacrifices,  
common to one who finds himself  
a part of a Negro Baseball Club.  
Later when his chance came to  
play as a member of a white team  
in a white League, he was hood-  
winked, and spurned by those whom  
he had hoped to entertain. One day  
a black cat was turned loose in the  
park to greet him as an omen of  
ill will. But these pressures merely  
served as a stimulus to his success.  
You see he had disciplined his  
mind, and it was clear to him  
that to succeed meant to sacrifice;  
and self-sacrifice is the finest vir-  
tue to be achieved. He was able to  
control himself under these circum-  
stances, when he might have  
reacted explosively. He was at his  
best when it appeared that he was  
out there simply "pitching alone."

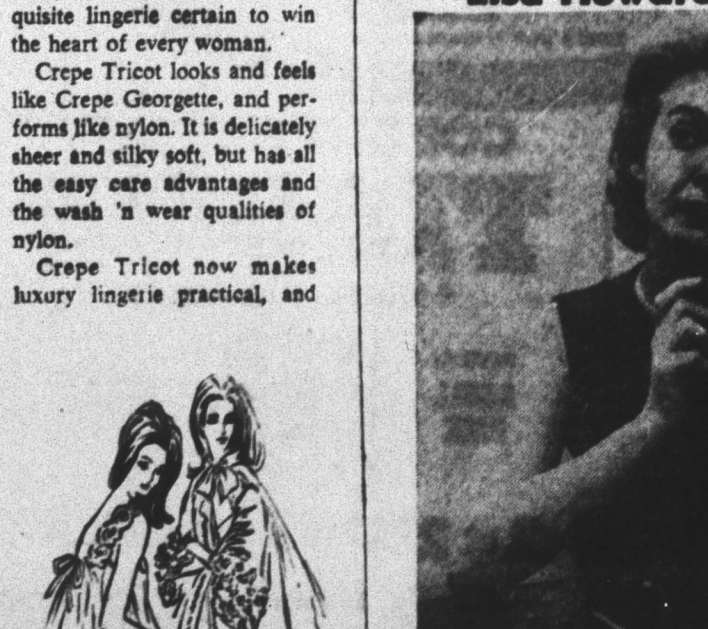
BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION - This is

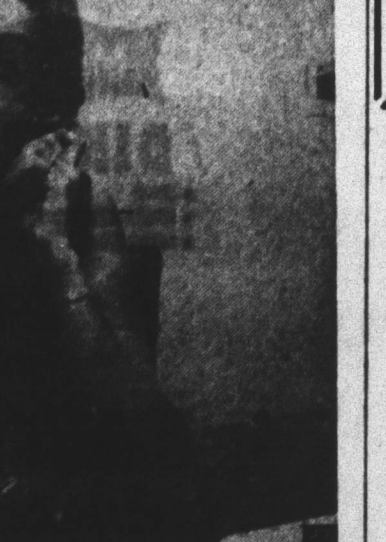
Lisa Howard, beautiful ABC-TV reporter, stars with noted guests

Vows To Fight On

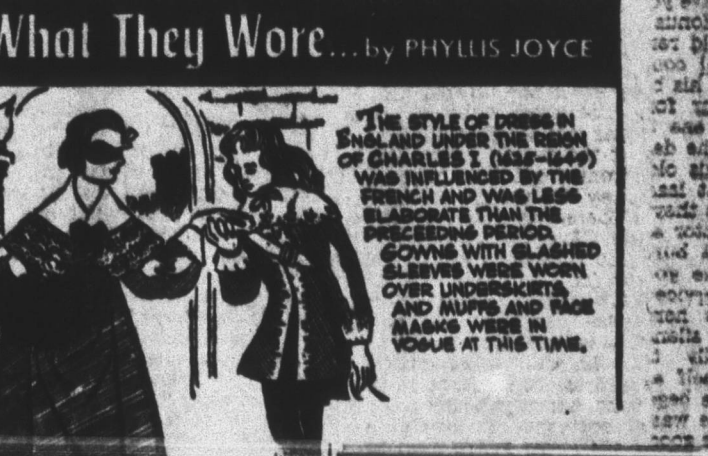
WASHINGTON (NPI) - Mrs. Mi-  
chael Schwerner, 22-year-old New

dered in Mississippi, vowed last  
week to remain in civil rights work  
"as long as I live."  
The youthful white wife of  
one of three civil rights work-  
ers whose bodies were found  
buried in the bank of a man-  
made dam near Philadelphia,  
Miss., pledged her life to civil  
rights work at a press confer-  
ence here the day she learned  
her husband's body had been  
found.  
Articulate and calm, and dressed  
in a green print dress, Mrs. Sch-  
werner said she had nothing but  
pity for the murderers of her husband  
and two others, Andrew Goodman,  
20, New York, and James Cheney,  
21, Meridian, Miss.

bined civil rights project to get  
Negroes to register and vote in  
Mississippi, disappeared June
