DURHAM — North Carolina College officials, headed by President Samuel P. Massie, Jr., emphasized the college's need for more land and presented capital improvement budget requests totaling \$7,741,000 for the 1965-67 biennium in a meeting last week with members of the State Advisory Budget Comm

Massie declared that land for the college's expansion "is our most urgent need if we are to move ahead."

We are now having to demolish current structures on the campus in order to build new ones, and most of the buildings we are destorying are still adequate," he said.

Requesting \$200,000 for addition land, he stated he proposed nurchases would increase
