

**EVERYBODY LOVES CHRISTMAS COOKIES FROM OLD TRADITIONAL RECIPES**

**Pfeffernusse**

1 lb. sugar  
4 eggs  
1 1/2 cups currants  
1 1/2 cups walnuts  
2 tsp. cinnamon  
2 tsp. cloves  
1/2 tsp. black pepper  
1 tsp. nutmeg  
3 tsp. baking powder  
4 cups sifted flour

Roll into one-inch balls with hands. Bake on greased cookie sheet for 18 minutes at 350°.

**Honig Kuchen**

1 cup honey  
1 cup sugar  
2 tbsp. orange juice  
1 oz. each citron, orange, lemon peels  
1/4 tsp. each cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, allspice  
2 cups sifted flour  
1/4 tsp. salt  
2-2/3 cups almonds  
Heat honey. Add sugar and juice. Grind peels, blanched almonds. Add to sugar. Add flour and other dry ingredients. Cover and chill 8 days. Roll thin and cut with floured cutter in heart shapes, topping with almond. Bake on greased sheets 8 to 10 minutes in 325° oven. Frost with mixture of confectioner's sugar, orange juice and grated rind. Store in airtight container two weeks.

**Tuttle Parents' Club Presents \$500 Towards Building Fund**

Mrs. Mattie Edmondson, president of the Board of Directors of Tuttle Community Center received a check of \$500 presented by Rev. Leatha Debnam, a member of The Parents' Club last week. The wooden part of the building has to be restored and the parents are undertaking projects to help toward this construction. Charles Haywood has already turned in \$2118 from the sale of scrap paper, and other projects are underway. Tuttle Community Center has a unique history, which began in 1924. Dr. A. E. Bunker formerly of Saint Augustine's College, gave a little three-room wooden structure to the community for a character building center. Every inch of the new seven-room building is in use daily, for a long day too, by six or seven thousand people a month. This gift to the community has proved its worth, for thousands of

**Urban League Plans Radio Program Soon**

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The National Urban League will begin a quarter-hour radio summary of weekly civil rights events over Radio Station WWRL at 8 p. m. Saturday night, it was announced last week. The "National Civil Rights Roundup" will report and analyze developments in the area of race relations, according to Frank Ward, station manager. It is the League's first regular weekly radio program. Sherwood Ross, news director for the interracial professional social work agency, will produce and narrate the program for the station. "There is a great need to provide listeners of Negro-oriented radio stations, and the general public, with a program of this type. To our knowledge, it is not now being done and will fill a vacuum on the airwaves," he said. "It is particularly important in the South, where the press often does not fairly present both sides of the news." Ward said the newcast will be carried on WDIA, Memphis; WO-PA, Chicago; KDIA, Oakland, Calif.; and KFOX, Long Beach, Calif.; all affiliated with WWRL. In addition, the National Urban League will make the program available to stations in other market areas. Ross, 31, of 541 E. 20th St., New York City, last year received an award for his one-hour documentary on the March on Washington, aired over Radio Station WAAF, Chicago. Prior to his present post with the League, he was public relations director of its Chicago affiliate from December, 1962, until April, 1964. Before that he covered urban renewal and city planning affairs for the Chicago Daily News.
