The Republicans of Colorado are considering the advisability of breaking away from the national organization and forming a new party, whose platform shall be free silver, free trade, Western rights and anti-monopoly and retaliation.

To-night a conference of leading republicans was held to consider the matter and the result was the issuance of the following call by the chairman of the Republican State Central Committee:

To the members of the Republican State Central Committee: A meeting of all the members of the Republican State Central Committee is hereby called to be held at the assembly room of the Denver Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday, September 5, 1893, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The Democratic party and the administration stands pledged to inaugurate an era of paper money by removing the tax on bank issues, already proved to be a dangerous medium of exchange, and the fact that the Populist party is committed to experimental politics and unsafe vagaries in many of the reforms proposed, render it important to the interest of Colorado that members of the Republican State Central Committee should convene for consultation upon the grave conditions existing affecting the welfare of the State and for the purpose of arriving at, formulating and expressing, as the platform of the Republican party of the State, the principles and rules which should guide its members in the State's interest, to the end that the several county conventions soon to be held may take such uniform and concerted action as will best promote the cause

of free and unlimited human courage, the great issue of the hour, more important to all the people of the United States than the tariff and all other questions.
