### Good Advice to The Negro.

A young negro has risen in the South who gives promise of being of great benefit to his race. His words are not always pleasant words to the negro, but they are words of sound sense that, if heeded by the race to whom they are addressed, would go a long way toward solving the race problem. His name is W. W. Lucas, and he is the field secretary of the Negro Young People's Christian and Educational Congress that is to assemble in Atlanta in August. A few evenings ago he made an address to one of the largest negro congregations ever assembled in Mobile, and some of the things he said, and which his audience greatly applauded, are worthy of re-production and preservation. Speaking of the christian training needed by the colored race, he said:

"A great hindrance to the progress of the race is the two by four, bigoted, selfish, ignorant Baptist or Methodist preacher. He is in every community, opposing every measure of progress."

Unfortunately this is often true. The negro preacher is the most influential leader in the race, and not infrequently the most unscrupulous, planning devilment to which he incites his followers. Only the other day down in Georgia a negro preacher worked his congregation up to a great pitch of excitement, likening his race to the Hebrew children living in the brick-yards of southern white Egyptians, and predicting bloody plagues to come for their deliverance. Such men, though they may be too ignorant to know it, are the greatest obstruction to the well-being and progress of their race.

Then Lucas took a turn at some of the doctrines these "preachers" were preaching and some that they ought to preach and were not. He said that the result was that the average southern negro was prone to adjourn all their ambitions to the happy day when the negroes will be admitted en masse to 'hog heaven' and their white enemies be shunted into the goat-pen and swallowed up in Hades. On that point he wittily remarked:

"The white man is trying to make this earth blossom as a rose and the negro is getting ready to die! The white man is organizing business enterprises and the negroes organizing societies to

turn out to their funerals! Now, I object to a hundred-dollar funeral for a fifty cent negro."

Continuing his remarks Lucas told his race that it was their slovenliness that white people objected to more than the color of their skin.

I have decided that the only way to get rid of the "Jim Crow" car is to get rid of the "Jim Crow" negro. If I could use 200,000 bars of soap on the unwashed negroes that travel on trains and hang around depots I would solve the negro problem about 20 per cent. Lazy, ragged, bare feet fellows longing for silver slippers and long white robes and counting themselves worthy, neglecting to provide a home for their families on earth and yet claiming a house not made with their hands in God's heaven!

Truths well spoken, all of them, and truths that should be carried home to every negro in the land. If their preachers and leaders would preach to them this gospel of virtue, cleanliness and industry they would do more to elevate and uplift their race than all the philanthropists of New England have ever done or can ever hope to do; they would solve the race problem better than Congress can ever solve it.

The voice is like the voice of one crying in the wilderness, and the words are words of truth and soberness.

### The Trusts Own the Party.

Shortly before Congress adjourned, Mr. Richardson, the Democratic leader of the House, declared that the leading issue in the coming campaign would be the trust issue. During the session just closed many measures were advocated looking to withdrawing the protective tariff from those articles which are sold cheaper to foreigners than Americans, amending the present laws and making severer penalties. Just on the eve of the adjournment of Congress Mr. Richardson urged the majority, now that all administration measures and all appropriations were out of the way, to stay at Washington one week longer to give consideration to the anti trust bills that had been introduced and pigeon holed. He might as well have asked the Republican members to support a measure making them ineligible for reelection. They hastened to adjourn, without any action upon the illegal combinations and systematically robbing the people.

The truth is that the Republican party belongs to the trusts—body, soul and breathes. Trusts run the party, foot the bills, and then write taxing bills to reimburse themselves. The only hope of relief from the trusts is in the defeat of the party in power. Mr. Roosevelt talks mighty fine; so did Mr. McKinley, so will republican platforms. But "fair promises butter no parsnips," and nobody who "knows B from Bill's foot" pays attention to a republican declaration against trusts.

It is said Senator Pritchard's joint resolution giving pensionable status to soldiers who deserted the Confederate army and joined the Federal forces will distribute \$600,000 in Western North Carolina. It is the shame of the State if it is true. This resolution is not a thing for Senator Pritchard or for any body who voted for it to be proud of. The mark of Cain would better become these men than a pension.—Charlotte Observer.

### The Republican Split.

In the Congressional election which comes on in four months from this time the republican party will face an issue on which it is divided uncompromisingly in the Congress which has just ended its first session. This is the issue of the tariff. The trouble began in the preceding Congress, when the suggestion was made that protection should be withdrawn from the great steel trust. It which has just adjourned, and there it developed a wider scope. As it stands at the present moment and as it will stand in the campaign soon to open for the election of members of the new Congress, it is in effect the question of tariff for monopoly or a tariff for the people.

The revision of the Dingley tariff in its entirety is a matter which the new Congress will have to consider. It has passed the stage in which a single industry only is concerned. What Congressman Babcock proposed in relation to the steel trust is now proposed in relation to all other trusts, and the necessity is seen to be the same. Are the American people to be taxed to maintain monopolies? that is the question that will be asked of every candidate for Congress in every district in the land.

On this question the split of the Republican majority in Congress foreshadows the popular disturbance next November.
