## The Forth Carolina Bond Bill.

The legislation authorizing
隹 emboriel in House Bill embodiel in House Bill follows:
The General Ansambly of N . C. do enact:

Section 1. That for the pur pase of paying off the indebt edness of the State of North Carolina arising ont of ap propriations heretofore made for educational, charitable and other purposes, and for the purpose of continuing the good work already rommenc ed for the upbuilding State, the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and direet ed to issive bonds of $t h e$ State of North Carolina, pay day of Januay. 1903, to an ampunt not to exceed three amount not to pexceed three See, 2. A!! of said bonds shall bear interest at rate shal exceeding 4 per cent., not exceeding 4 per com the 1st day of January from the 1st day of January
1903, until paid, which said 1903, until paid, which said
interest shall be payablesemi interest shall be payablesemi
annually on the 1st days of January and July of each and every year so long as any portion of the said bonds hall remsin due and unpaid. Sec. 3. That the bonds authorized and directed to be issued by the preceding section shall be coupon bonds of the denominations of $\$ 100$, $\$ 500$ and $\$ 1,000$ each as may be determined by the sat Treasurer, and sealed with the great seal of the State. The coupons thereou may be signed by the State Treasuror alone, or may have a far simile of his siguature printed, engraved orlithographed thereon, and the sald bond shall in all other respects be
in all other respects be in in all other respects be in
such form as the said State Treanurer may direet; a n d the coupons thereon, shall, after maturity, be receivable in payment of all taxes, debts, dues, licenses, fines and demands due the State o Not th Carolina of any kind whatsoever, which shall be expressed on the face of said bonds. The l'reasurer may in his discretion, instead of coupon bonde of the denominations named, may issue as many one hundred thousand dollars of registered bonds of the denomination of $\$ 50$ mentionea in section one of this act. Before selling t he coupon bonds herein author ized to be issued, the treasu invite sealed bidn, in suc b manner as in his judgment may seetn effectual to secur the best price. He is author ized to accept bidu for the en
tire issue, or any portion shereof, and where the condi tions are equal, he shull give the preference of purchase to the citizens of Forth Carolina. And he is authorized to seel the registered bonds here in guthorized, in such manner as in his jodgment produce the best price.
See. 4. The said bonds and coupons shall beexempt from all State, county
pal taxation, or
direct or indirect, general or sperial, whether imposed for
purpnges of general revenow or otherwise, and the inter:est paid thereon shall not he nhjert to taxation as for in income.
Sec. 5. It shall belawfolfor all exerutors, administrafore raardiane and Aduciaries rea rally to invest in said bonds. Nec. 6. That this act shall in force from and after ita atification.
