Milllonalre to Pauper. The Charlotte Observer o
the 13th contnined the fol lowing account of the life aud earcer of Col. W. T. Blackwell, who died at bia home in
Durham on the night of the Durham on the night of the 12th. It sass:
"So has pansed one of the strangest and inost interest ing flagres in the industria
history in North Carolina history in North Caroina.
Col. Blackwell was the son of Jhmes L. Blaek well and apent his early life in Person county. For a good wany yeare ty. For a good wany yrare lihood. Shortly after the wa he and General Julian S. Carr and Jamos P. Day organizod
the tirm of W. T. Blarkwell \& Company, which was des tined to become the largest tobacco eoncern in tha South if not in the world.
"The firm was succopsful from the first and daunted the universe -even on the pyr amide of Egypt it wasdeclar ed at one time. The fatine of Bull Dorham tobarco berame world wide and money llowed into the coffers of the three organizers. They spent millions in advertising; had men London and other great citles and ask for the tohasco and devised other srheme mand every where.
"Some 15 years ago Colone Blackwell sold out his inter est in the company to Gener al Carr and several Northern men. He reseived a large a
mount for his interest, being paid $\$ 20,000$ merely for the use of the trade-mark, the celetrated bull.
"In a day almost his fortunes were swept a was. There Was a financint crash in Dur* failed in 24 murcantile arms failed in 24 hours and hundreds of individuals were sen
sibly or seriously depressed. When the day of rackoniug cane, it was found, to use a eurrent expression 'that Col. Blackwell's name was on ev-
ery man's paper.' He had from his view point endorsed for his friends. His generosity ruined him-ruined him o penly and notoriousls.
