Hardin, charged with violations of the internal revenue laws and with making false reports, was given to the jury at 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon At a late hour last night the jury retired without having agreed upon a verdict. Judge Boyd's charge to the jury was a clear and comprehensive review of the evidence in the case, and of the law with reference to the charge against the defendant. There are six charges in the bill of indictment.
