On Woman's Rights.
"Wives submit yourselves unto your own husbands as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the Church; and He is the Savior of the body. Therefore as the Church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in everything. Husbands love your wives even as Christ also loved the Church, and gave himself for it, that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a Glorious Church, not having spot or wrinkle or any such things; but that it should be holy and without blemish. So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife, loveth himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh, but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the Church: For we are members of his body, of his flesh and of his bone. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother and shall be joined unto his wife and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery, but I speak concerning Christ and the Church. Nevertheless, let every one of you in particular so love his wife even as himself; and the wife see that she reverence her husband."

"I will therefore that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands without wrath and doubting. In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with braided hair or gold, or pearls or costly array—but which becometh women professing godliness with good works. Let the women learn in silence with all subjection, But I suffer not a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in silence. For Adam was first formed then Eve, and Adam was not deceived, but the woman being perceived was in the transgression. Notwithstanding, she shall be saved in child bearing, if they continue in faith and charity and holiness with sobriety."

The above are Scriptures of the New Testament found in Eph. 5 22-33 inclusive, and in Timothy 2:8 15 inclusive. Complied, which condemn "Women Suffrage," speaking in public, lecturing and other masculine attitudes of women, now being practised and receiving advocacy in some States of the Republic. Also which contain admonition to husbands; thereby showing the Christian attitude of both sexes too plainly to admit of controversy.

The Jews and Palestine.
There are now nearly a score of Jewish colonies in various parts of Palestine supporting themselves by tilling the land and waiting hopefully for the day when the son of Judah shall possess sovereignty over their ancient inheritance. The number of Jews in the Promised Land has increased astonishingly of late years. So that there are now more Jews in Jerusalem itself than there were in all Palestine 20 years ago there were not more than 12,000 in all the holy Land. At present the Jews in Jerusalem are put down at 45,000 and in all the country at over 100,000. The recent influx of Jews has been twice the number that returned with Zerubbabel to Babylon. And so soon as a favorable move is made upon the political chess board of the orient, the Jews are prepared to seize the opportunity for repatriation in still greater multitudes. There is no doubt that with their present wealth and enterprise they could plant such a colony there as does not elsewhere exist in the known world.—Chicago Interior.

If the possession of great undeveloped natural resources is a safe basis for predictions of a great future, the South is the region to look to. Its coal fields exceed in area and contents those of Pennsylvania, the "mother country" and the "Fatherland." In iron ore it has vast resources, and the same is to be said of its sulphur, phosphates, petroleum and materials for Portland cement.
